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Study Options

A Master's degree contains a total of 120 credits, 78 of which are to be completed in the subject/s studied; a further 12 credits have to be obtained through soft skills modules (language skills, mediation, ... – anything that does not belong to the core curricula of the subject/s studied), and the final 30 credits are awarded for the Master's thesis.

There are different study options for English: Language, Literatures and Cultures at Master's level:

(1) Study Option Single Honours Master of Arts in English: Language, Literatures and Cultures

- modules from various divisions are *combined* to complete the core curriculum ("Pick and Mix" study option).

By selecting their modules accordingly, students can obtain a certificate in one of the following options:

- *Studies in English Literature and Culture: Focus on Literary and Cultural Management* (this option includes an obligatory module with an internship in a literature or culture industry company, e.g. a publishing house or literary festival)
- *Anglophone Literature and Culture* (see description for minor subject below)
- *Literary and Cultural Studies* (study option combining modules from the Anglophone Literature and Culture and North American Studies divisions only)
- *Language in Focus: Linguistics and Medieval English Studies* (study option combining modules from the English Linguistics and Medieval English Studies divisions only)

(2) Study Option Joint Honours Master of Arts in English: Language, Literatures and Cultures

This study option combines English: Language, Literatures and Cultures as a major (42 C core curriculum modules plus 30 credits Master's thesis) with one or two minor subjects (36 C / 2x 18 C).

(3) Study Option Joint Honours Master of Arts with English: Language, Literatures and Cultures as a Minor

For this study option English: Languages, Literatures and Cultures is chosen as a minor subject (36 C) in combination with another degree programme at 42 credits; the Master's thesis is completed in the degree programme, not in English: Language, Literatures and Cultures.

(3.1) Study Option English: Language, Literatures and Cultures / "Pick and Mix"

- Students commonly combine modules from several divisions to make up the 36 core curriculum credits.

The Department of English offers two separate module packages, though, focusing on different content areas:

(3.2) Study Option Anglophone Literature and Culture

- The module package (minor subject) Anglophone Literature and Culture contains core curriculum modules worth 36 credits in total. They are exclusively taken on areas pertaining to Anglophone literature and culture; linguistics and North American modules cannot be chosen.

(3.3) Study Option Language in Focus: Linguistics and Medieval English Studies

- This study option contains 36 credits worth of modules from the English Linguistics and Medieval English Studies divisions and offers students the chance of focusing exclusively on areas pertaining to the study of English as a language.

(4) Study Option Joint Honours Master of Arts with English: Language, Literatures and Cultures as a Second Minor

- In this study option English: Language, Literatures and Cultures functions as the second minor subject at 18 credits, to be taken in combination with another minor subject worth 18 credits and a degree programme worth 42 credits; the Master's thesis is completed in the degree programme, not in English: Language, Literatures and Cultures.

What Is a Certificate?

The Single Honours programme enables students to study for certificates. This means that they have to complete a specific combination of modules from the range of the modules available. The certificate is NOT a separate document. When graduates receive their MA diploma, the certificate is listed as a special qualification. However, students take the same modules as other students – it is only the *combination* that results in acquiring a certificate. We hope that future employers will be interested in them, but we cannot guarantee this. It is the totality of a graduate's study course that will be of key interest to employers.

Admissions Requirements

(1) Single Honours Master of Arts in English: Language, Literatures and Cultures (78 C) and Joint Honours Master of Arts in English: Language, Literatures and Cultures (42 C)

- “relevant” Bachelor of Arts degree programme, containing a minimum of 50 credits worth of courses / modules pertaining to areas of English studies (i.e. from English linguistics, medieval English studies, English or Anglophone literature and culture, North American literature and culture, practical English language courses, UK or American life and institutions courses). Only 50% of courses deemed to be relating to English Studies may be on areas of practical English language skills.
- “sufficient” level of English, defined by GPAs in standardised tests: at least UNICert® III; NULTE certificate minimum C1; 180 points minimum on Cambridge English scale; IELTS at least band 6.5; 110 points minimum in TOEFL iBT; 76 points minimum on Global Scale of English
- international students with few or no German language skills (less than DSH-1) are required to complete the 12 credits in the soft skills area by completing modules in German as a Foreign Language

(2) 36 C Module Packages / Minors: English: Language Literatures and Cultures, Anglophone Literature and Culture, and Language in Focus: Linguistics and Medieval English Studies (minor)

- Bachelor of Arts degree programme, containing a minimum of 42 credits worth of courses / modules pertaining to areas of English studies (i.e. from English linguistics, medieval English studies, English or Anglophone literature and culture, North American literature and culture, practical English language courses, UK or American life and institutions courses)
- this includes a module on practical English language skills worth 12 credits

(3) 18 C Module Package / Second Minor English: Language, Literatures and Cultures

- Bachelor of Arts degree programme, containing a minimum of 24 credits worth of courses / modules pertaining to areas of English studies (i.e. from English linguistics, medieval English studies, English or Anglophone literature and culture, North American literature and culture, practical English language courses, UK or American life and institutions courses)

- this includes a module on practical English language skills worth 6 credits

Note that students combining English: Language, Literatures and Cultures with North American Studies on a subject basis (i.e. English: Language, Literatures and Cultures at 42 credits with North American Studies at 36 credits, or vice versa) **MUST** choose the Anglophone Literature modules. **North American Studies modules canNOT be chosen for completing the core curriculum in English: Language, Literatures and Cultures.**

Suggestions for Studying: Starting the Programme

Students starting their degree programmes with little detailed knowledge in the key areas they are interested in should start with foundations modules. This means in particular:

Anglophone Literature	M.EP.01c (12 C)	giving an overview of literary analysis and literary theories, and how to use them
North American Studies	M.EP.01b (6 C)	introducing students to key concepts in North American cultural rhetorics
Linguistics	M.EP.020 (6 C)	giving an overview of key concepts and key approaches in linguistics
	M.EP.022 (12 C)	<i>for students wishing to build up: laying focus on syntactic and semantic theories, take after M.EP.020 is completed or with sound knowledge of linguistics</i>
Medieval Studies	M.EP.02c (6 C)	giving an overview of the key developments in the history of English and in medieval English literature and culture

Students should consider what their prime interest lies with and choose one 12 credit module or two 6 credit modules for their first semester.

In their first semester, students should also take a **Practical English Language** module. Since all teaching is done in English, and since all exams are held in English, having a very good grasp of English is vital for a student's success. You will need to complete either module M.EP.15a "Comprehensive Master-Module Advanced Practical English Language Skills" (worth 6 C) or M.EP.15b "American Culture and Institutions/British Culture and Institutions" (also worth 6C). Furthermore, module M.EP.14 "Academic Writing and Research Skills" is a compulsory module worth a total of 6 C. Therefore, we recommend choosing either module M.EP.15a or M.EP.15b or M.EP.14 during your first semester.

Alongside this, students should take **German classes** in their first semester. While many people at University speak English, their living surroundings will be mostly German-language focused. It helps settle in more quickly if students have or acquire German language skills.

Which Module for Which Semester?

Given the broad range of modules and courses on offer, there is no 'master plan' for studying with us. Especially for their first semesters, students are asked to contact the Student Advisors Katharina Nambula or Dr. Frauke Reitemeier for help. During the Orientation Week, international students will discuss their timetable for their first semester that takes into account both the German language requirements and possible learning agreements. Which Module for Which Study Option?

The following directions are very brief. They refer to the synoptic tables on the next pages.

(1) Study Options Single Honours Master of Arts in English: Language, Literatures and Cultures

- For the “Pick and Mix” study option,
 - take M.EP.14 as a must-have;
 - take one of the two modules from the ‘Elective Compulsory Modules I’ section (M.EP.15a or M.EP.15b);
 - choose a minimum of 5 elective modules worth a total of min 60 credits, amongst them M.EP.Ac101 if unacquainted with German universities;
 - take one completion module alongside your MA thesis.
- For a certificate on *Anglophone Literature and Culture*,
 - take M.EP.14 as a must-have;
 - take one of the two modules from the ‘Elective Compulsory Modules I’ section (M.EP.15a or M.EP.15b);
 - choose a minimum of 4 elective modules worth a total of min 42 credits, amongst them M.EP.Ac101 if unacquainted with German universities;
 - complete modules M.EP.04a and M.EP.09a;
 - take the Anglophone Literature completion module alongside your MA thesis.
- For a certificate on *Literary and Cultural Studies*,
 - take M.EP.14 as a must-have;
 - take one of the two modules from the ‘type 1 obligatory’ section (M.EP.15a or M.EP.15b);
 - choose modules from the ‘type 2 obligatory’ section worth a total of 12 credits;
 - choose a minimum of 6 elective modules worth a total of min 48 credits, amongst them M.EP.Ac101 if unacquainted with German universities;
 - take one of the ‘type 3 obligatory’ completion modules alongside your MA thesis.
- For a certificate on *Language in Focus*,
 - take M.EP.14 as a must-have;
 - take one of the two modules from the ‘type 1 obligatory’ section (M.EP.15a or M.EP.15b);
 - choose a minimum of 6 elective modules worth a total of min 60 credits, amongst them M.EP.Ac101 if unacquainted with German universities;
 - take one of the ‘type 2 obligatory’ completion module alongside your MA thesis.

- For a certificate on *Literary and Cultural Management*,
 - take M.EP.14 as a must-have;
 - take one of the two modules from the ‘type 1 obligatory’ section (M.EP.15a or M.EP.15b);
 - choose a minimum of 3 elective modules worth a total of min 30 credits from the ‘elective type 1’ section (including the Anglophone Literature and Culture completion module alongside your MA thesis);
 - take a minimum of 2 elective modules tagged ‘elective type 2’ worth a total of min 24 credits;
 - choose a minimum of 2 elective modules worth min 12 credits from the ‘elective type 3’ section, amongst them M.EP.Ac101 if unacquainted with German universities.

(2) Study Option Joint Honours Master of Arts in English: Language, Literatures and Cultures

- For the “Pick and Mix” study option,
 - take M.EP.14 as a must-have;
 - take one of the two modules from the ‘type 1 obligatory’ section (M.EP.15a or M.EP.15b);
 - choose a minimum of 2 elective modules worth a total of 24 credits, amongst them M.EP.Ac101 if unacquainted with German universities;
 - take one of the ‘type 3 obligatory’ completion modules alongside your MA thesis.

(3) Study Options Minors (Module Packages)

- For the “English: Language, Literatures and Cultures (second major)” study option,
 - take M.EP.14 as a must-have;
 - take one of the two modules from the ‘type 1 obligatory’ section (M.EP.15a or M.EP.15b);
 - choose 2 elective modules worth a total of 24 credits.
- For the “Anglophone Literature and Culture (second major)” study option,
 - choose at least 4 elective modules worth a total of 36 credits.
- For the “Language in Focus (second major)” study option,
 - choose at least 4 elective modules worth a total of 36 credits.
- For the “English: Language, Literatures and Cultures (minor / 18 credits)” study option,
 - take one of the two modules from the ‘type 1 obligatory’ section (M.EP.14 or M.EP.15a);
 - choose one or two elective modules worth a total of 12 credits.

Soft Skills Modules

International students with little or no German language skills (less than DSH-1/ TDN3) are required to take modules on German as a Foreign Language worth at least 12 credits for their soft skills curriculum which forms part of their degree programme. For German classes students should contact the Lektorat Deutsch als Fremdsprache. If students have some German language skills already, they will take a diagnostic test at Lektorat. All other students have to complete 12 credits worth of soft skills modules as part of their degree programme. The soft skills range of modules offered by the Faculty of Humanities is large and varied, and students are encouraged to look at the course offers on EXA.

A Brief Explanation of Exam Types

Please note that this is merely an outline of different exam types intended to provide you with an overview. For an authoritative guide to any specific module's and course instructor's requirements and expectations, please consult the information material provided by your course instructor. You can find binding information on the examination in a specific course on the syllabus or in a separate file such as an introductory session's PowerPoint presentation. This material is made available on Stud.IP in the first week of class. Check your course's "Files" section!

These are the most common types of exam you will encounter in the Master's programme English: Language, Literatures and Cultures.

1. Portfolio

In general, a portfolio is a collection of different task and assignments, which you complete over the course of the term and which you collectively submit at the end of the semester (in one file). In our programme, portfolios come at varying lengths and will be either graded or ungraded – it depends on the module you are taking.

Take the example of the foundations module in Anglophone Literature, M.EP.01c: Anglophone Literature and Culture: Theoretical Foundations. For this module's compulsory course "Literary and Cultural Theory in Use," you hand in an exposé and an outline of your research project before you write a short term paper. You will receive feedback on the exposé and the outline and get a chance to revise your drafts before you hand in the exposé, the outline, and the term paper as your final submission, the portfolio.

Another example is module M.EP.Ac101: (Intercultural) Academic Skills. The final exam of this module, which asks you to attend workshops and consultations with your academic advisors, consists of five different assignments you can work on throughout the course of your studies: 1) an outline of a term paper on a topic of your choice; 2) a commented bibliography on the topic you have chosen for your paper outline; 3) a close reading of a text passage of your choice; 4) a commented library reserve shelf for a course; 5) a 5-minute PowerPoint presentation on a topic of your choice. When you have attended all compulsory workshops and consultations and have completed these five different assignments amounting to 3500 words, you hand in your responses to these assignments as your portfolio.

The portfolio is also one of two exams in the foundations module M.EP.01a. We will describe the graded oral or written exam you have to take in this module below. The ungraded portfolio in this module concludes the so-called Independent Study element of M.EP.01a. Independent Study means that you work independently on a research project that is closely connected to the topic of the lecture you attend for this module. Specifically, you will conduct substantial research, consulting a good number of critical sources, on topics of your own choice that link to and further the topic of the lecture before presenting your chosen topics to your instructor during their office hour. For your portfolio, you will hand in altogether handouts; each of these should give a short summary of your findings on one page or less and present a research bibliography that gives at least five sources. Together, these handouts count as your final portfolio for the Independent Study-part of module M.EP.01a. Please consult the instructor of the lecture for further information.

2. Written exam / end-of-term test

This format, designed to test your knowledge on a course topic, should be very familiar to you and requires little explanation. You may encounter it in modules offered in Practical English Language as well as in foundational modules that contain a lecture course, for example in M.EP.01a – here it functions as an alternative to the oral exam – , M.EP.02b and M.EP.02c (Medieval Studies). While end-of-term tests are usually written at the end of the semester in the lecture halls and classrooms where the courses took place, the move to distance teaching and learning has forced many instructors to adapt this exam type to an online-friendly format, such as the open-book-exam. An open-book-exam allows you to take a look at your notes while working on the exam questions, which may take the form of essay questions, yet the time given to complete the exam – usually 90 minutes – remains unchanged.

3. Oral exam

Oral exams come in different modules; for example, they may be part of M.EP.031-N and M.EP.032-N, depending on the course suggestions you have been given after the Diagnostic Test. The oral exam is also an option to conclude module M.EP.01a and the completion modules. While the oral exams of the completion modules at the end of your studies are usually 30 minutes in duration, you should talk about your course instructor's specific expectations and requirements, as these differ from division to division. In Anglophone Literature (M.EP.06a), for example, the oral exam is a defence of your thesis project, whereas in North American Studies (M.EP.06b), the oral exam can either be on a course topic or a presentation of your work-in-progress.

M.EP.01a consists of two components, a lecture course you will attend and complete with a graded oral exam (or written exam, for which see above), and an ungraded portfolio that documents your work for the Independent Study requirements of this module. For an explanation of the portfolio for Independent Study, go back to the explanation of the exam type "portfolio." In the oral exam for M.EP.01a, you will be tested on your knowledge of the content of the lecture. During the 20 minutes, you respond to your instructor's questions on the texts discussed and information provided in the lecture. In preparation for the exam, you can give your instructor three lecture sessions you wish to name as special fields of interest where you exhibit in-depth knowledge. (The written exam, by contrast, consists of two essay questions which have to be completed in 90 minutes.)

4. Term paper (varying length)

Term papers come at varying lengths, but the most common word count in the M.A. programme is 7500 words. Usually, the topic of the paper is your choice; it combines your individual preferences (interests, abilities, knowledge) and the topic of the seminar (general topic, in-class discussions, critical and theoretical texts discussed, notes taken). A term paper consists of an introduction (must include thesis and/or research question, methodology, and paper outline, may include necessary preparatory remarks such as a short overview of the main trends of criticism relevant to your topic); a body or main part with chapters and sub-chapters (arguments to support your thesis as well as the theoretical basis of your paper, the current state of research on the topic, remarks regarding the cultural and historical background of your primary material as well as close reading elements), a conclusion (must refer back to thesis and summarize your main findings, may include outlook for further research), a List of Works Cited (MLA Style), and a Statement of Academic Honesty. Please refer to the Anglophone Literature division's Guidelines for Academic Papers and Academic Writing for further information and to download a draft of the Plagiarism Statement.

5. Reading logs

Reading logs are the type of examination you are required to supply for module M.EP.10a: Historical Aspects of Anglophone Literature and Culture. Specifically, you will hand in 2 reading logs of altogether 4500 words. There are a few steps to complete before you start writing these reading logs. As you are attending a lecture course to take credits in this module, your first task is to familiarise yourself with all texts from the reading list and to choose two areas of interest from the theme or period that is the topic of the lecture series (e.g. a historical event, a moment of political or social crisis, a literary or artistic movement). When you have found the two topics for your reading logs, choose two texts for each of the two reading logs. The texts have to relate to the

context of the lecture series, but only one of the texts can be taken from the lecture's reading list; the other one should be your own choice and based on your research. Make sure the two chosen texts connect in a meaningful way to facilitate your writing process. For the reading logs, write a brief summary of your chosen texts (covering key characteristics such as topic, content, relation to the lecture series, and relation to each other) and contextualise the texts in your overall understanding of the period or the theme covered by the lecture series. Finally, analyse the texts through a particular theoretical lens (e.g. Postcolonial studies, gender studies, cultural materialism, disability studies, etc.). When you have finished writing your reading logs, send both, together with a signed Declaration of Academic Honesty, via email to your instructor. Keep in mind that you have to take two mandatory advisory meetings while working on your reading logs. We advise that you see your instructor for the first one of these meetings early on in the term to discuss your topic of interest and chosen approach. The North American Studies division has a similar type of exam called response logs.

6. Presentation with discussion

This type of examination asks you to give an in-class presentation on a topic of your choice that relates closely to the course topic. After the presentation, you need to hand in a write-up of your presentation; you can elaborate your topic and analysis further and include the feedback you have received for your presentation. This type of exam is usually based on a visual aid, such as a PowerPoint presentation, and often involves discussion questions that engage your peers. However, you should discuss the specific requirements and expectations with your instructor and meet them early in the term to talk about the presentation topic.

7. Examination-like term paper (usually 3500 – 4000 words)

In some linguistic modules (M.EP.022 and M.EP.11a) the requirement is an examination-like term paper. This is a collection of different tasks or assignments to be worked on during the semester. Examination-like term papers are take home exams; i.e. you are not only allowed but expected to use your notes, slides, textbooks, or other resources. The requirement can be split into two or three assignments following the progress of the course. Examination-like term papers are of various type and length (specified in the course manual):

- Short answer exams focus on knowledge and understanding of terms and concepts;
- Case studies or problem set exams require you to analyse linguistic data with a specific method and to form generalizations that verify or falsify a hypothesis. The emphasis is on methodological and conceptual understanding and application of theoretical knowledge.
- Essay exams provide a more complex task that requires responses which can vary in length from a couple of paragraphs to many pages. A journal paper discussed in class can be the prompt of an essay. Essay questions are less structured, what allows you to demonstrate that you can integrate the course material in creative ways. This type of exam presents a range of questions divided into topic sections covered in the course. You may be expected to give an essay response on more than one topic and show how theories have contributed to the knowledge areas.

8. Special Option for Grades: Deletion of Grades

You can choose to have your passed graded module examination converted into an ungraded module examination, by submitting an application requesting for grade modules amounting to up-to 12C in the subject area of "English: Language, Literature and Cultures, not to be considered when calculating the overall results of your masters examination. Such an application must be submitted before the examination certificate is issued. If you intend to change universities, the application should be accomplished beforehand, i.e., before you undertake the change. Please also note that, such an application can only be done **once**, unrenovable and irreversible, once approved and implemented in the examination administration system.
