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The Summer Method/s: Interdisciplinary Insights and Networking Opportunities

The annual GGG Week of Methods offers compact opportunities to broaden the own repertoire of methods and expand knowledge through interdisciplinary dialogue with other PhD students. Additionally, there is plenty of room for active exchange and networking between PhD students.

The 11th GGG Interdisciplinary Week of Methods took place from July 18 to 21, 2016, providing the opportunity to broaden the own method knowledge by interdisciplinary exchange. In four parallel workshops, current research methods and techniques of the social sciences were taught, directly relating to individual PhD projects. Over the past few years, a keynote speech about an interdisciplinarily interesting topic, followed by a discussion, has marked the start of the Week of Methods. Unfortunately, this time it had to be canceled due to an acute illness. However, the keynote speech will be offered again next year.

As the participants come from the entire range of social sciences, bringing in perspectives from Law, Social Sciences, Economics, and the fields of Agricultural Economics and Forestry as well as Forest and Nature Conservation Policy, an interdisciplinary and inter-



national composition is certainly preprogrammed. Due to the variety of perspectives that come together this way, interdisciplinary discussions arise and new perspec-

tives can be gained concerning the own projects. At the same time, new methods from other disciplines can be acquired or existing knowledge can be deepened. Or, to put it in a different way, after e. g. an ethnologist has explained the benefits and concepts of their methodological approach to a sports scientist and a business economist, not only those hearing about the method for the first time benefit from this dialogue. In fact, interdisciplinary discussions do not only broaden one's horizon but also help to question basic assumptions that are part of any method.

New funding: Language revision grant

If you are writing your thesis in German but are not a German native speaker, you may apply for editing funding as a GGG member. Your thesis should be completed textually during editing but not have been submitted to the faculty. Funding covers an acknowledged editor's fee working with you on error control and linguistic improvement of the text. Next application deadline is September 30, 2016.

The former living and working quarters of Carl-Friedrich Gauss, which are used by Lichtenberg-Kolleg and as a conference center nowadays, is usually not publicly available. Across creaking boards and ancient stairways we reached the observatory's dome, whose



mechanics were particularly impressive for us as theorists, and admired the telescope from the 1920s. We let the evening pass in the pleasant shadow of the observatory, participants and lecturers reviewing the first two days of workshops together with GGG team members and relaxing with tasty grilled food and cold beverages.

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Are you a "freshman"?

On this page we provide information for PhD students at irregular intervals who have just started doing their PhD or joined GGG only recently. This section is mainly intended for newcomers but holds useful information for experienced PhD students as well.

First of all, we would like to welcome you! As Graduate School of Social Sciences, we will use our best endeavor to be a supportive companion during your PhD.

Admission to PhD

You can find general information on admission to PhD studies and enrollment at Götingen University on the university Office for Student Affairs' website.

For all questions concerning prerequisites, application deadlines, recognition of academic degrees, and the PhD procedure please contact the Dean's Office or the Office of Student Affairs in the respective faculty.

After you have found a professor to supervise your PhD, you should clarify financing e.g. with your supervisor. The GGG is pleased to help you by providing competent support in PhD Funding quidance.

Please enroll at the university's Registrar's Office once you have received admission by the faculty. Enrollment is obligatory for PhD students.

Doctoral studies

There are three ways of doing a PhD in social sciences at Göttingen University:

- individual doctorate at the Faculty of Law.
- doctoral program at the Faculties of Forest and Agricultural Sciences, Social Sciences and Economic Sciences or
- in a doctoral group, e.g. a Research Training Group (RTG).

If you are doing an *individual doctorate*, you will write your thesis supervised by your professor at the Faculty of Law and register with the Dean's Office.

A doctoral program means you will write a thesis, or scientific papers (cumulative dissertation) and complete a structured study program additionally. In doing so, you will take courses on methods and key competences as well as colloquia amounting to 20 credits in total. This is the only way of doing a PhD in the abovementioned four faculties in Göttingen.

A *doctoral group* subsumes PhD students with regard to a particular topic. These groups work interdisciplinary or across institutes. All current groups that are GGG members are available online.

It is recommended, or obligatory (depending on the type of PhD) that you and your supervisor sign a PhD agreement, determining starting point, subject and the parties involved in your PhD. Moreover, you should discuss your work's progress with your supervisor on a regular basis, at least once a year.

This is also about compliance of good scientific practice, which the scientific community is committed to. To avoid scientific misconduct, Göttingen University and the DFG have published a collection of recommendations.

During your PhD studies you will not be supervised by a single person but a supervising committee. Such committees consist of two, mostly three PhD supervisors, and you. This institution has been established to make PhD students talk about the progress of their PhD regularly and find a solution together in case there are problems.

All types of PhD studies have in common that the thesis is to be submitted at the faculty, with the oral exam being taken at the faculty as well. Therefore, you will have the respective Office of Student Affairs' support in all formal aspects of your PhD.

Support by the GGG

Once you have been admitted for doing a PhD in one of the doctoral groups, at the Faculty of Law, the Faculty of Social Sciences, or the Faculty of Economic Sciences, or at parts of the Faculty of Forest and Agricultural Sciences, you automatically become a GGG member.

We kindly ask you to send our questionnaire to GGG and update it, if needed, to make sure we are able to contact you. Your data will be treated confidentially and used within GGG only.

There are no obligations attached to GGG membership. In fact, you have access to:

- the GGG course program,
- the GGG counseling offers,
- the Helpdesk for International PhD students as well as
- GGG support measures.

Like in any profession, scientists are frequently faced with dilemmas: Can I exclude particular observations from my research? Can I use exactly the same data set for multiple papers? Should I agree on a colleague being a co-author on a paper to which she has not made a significant contribution? By exposing you to such dilemmas in the context of a critical dialogue, this game aims to support you in further developing your own "moral compass". This game was developed as one of the initiatives of the EUR Taskforce Scientific Integrity (chaired by Prof. Dr. Finn Wynstra). Its objective is to raise awareness for and to develop proposals to help maintain scientific professionalism and integrity.

Nelly C. Schubert

Nelly C. Schubert is a mentee in the WeWiMento program – paths into science management and has been a guest student at GGG office within the context of the program since July 2016. In the following, she briefly presents herself and reports on her experiences:



I am a research assistant and PhD student at Prof. Dr. Alexander-Kenneth Nagel's chair of Social Scientific Research into Religion that was established in 2015, which is located at the interface between the Institutes for Religious Studies and the Institute for Sociology both in terms of content and administration. Previously, I have been a junior research group member at the Center for Religious Studies (CERES) in Bochum. I started my PhD there, in which I explore representation relationships between local religious communities in the Ruhr area that bridge confessional and ethnical boundaries at the same time.

As a mother of two children and with equal ambitions in private and professional life I am struggling with different options for my future career in the final stage of my PhD: should I give the long and difficult road to (part-time) professorship a try, contribute my academic autonomous competences to science management or try something completely different that might be more compatible with a satisfied family life?

In this phase of professional orientation and setting of the course, I am lucky to be provided with large support within the WeWiMento program as one of 12 mentees. Besides individual support from my mentor Dr. Doreen Müller of the Göttingen Diversity Research Institute and a profile sharpening set of workshops, the program enables me to gain fascinating insights into university institutions and academic research institutes by work shadowing. A very enthusiastic and competent staff keeps me informed about their versatile daily operations at GGG offices, the humanities school laboratory YLAB and the Research Department of Division Strategic Measures / Institutional Strategy.

My initial conclusion at the halfway mark of the program: respectful, results-oriented conversations and solid, constructive questions pave the way for a career start, career success and job satisfaction.
