Kommentar

The lecture series will cover both Romantic and Victorian literature. During the 19th century, Britain saw an enormous increase of wealth and power, territorial expansion, technological innovations, industrialisation, scientific progress, and political and social reforms. At the same time, it was an age of fundamental crises of faith and norms and political discontent: The impact of the American and French Revolution resonates in many Romantic texts, and later Darwin's theory of evolution and other scientific discoveries called religion into question. Towards the end of the century gender norms were seriously contested and the belief in the empire and the ideology of progress began to erode. The lecture series will attempt at covering these conflicts, tensions, and paradoxes, as they are manifest in poetry, novels, essays, scientific discourses, drama and art.

Readings: It is recommended to purchase the volumes *Romanticism by Duncan Wu* (Blackwell) and *The Victorian Age* (Norton Anthology) for poetry and shorter prose pieces.

Novels: Joseph Conrad, *Heart of Darkness*; Charles Dickens, *Great Expectations*; Charlotte Brontë, *Jane Eyre*; George Eliot, *Middlemarch*; Thomas Hardy, *Far From the Madding Crowd*. Plays: Oscar Wilde, *The Importance of Being Earnest* and George Bernard Shaw, *Mrs Warren's Profession*.

Background reading: Christopher Harvie and H.C.G. Matthew, *Nineteenth-Century Britain: A Very Short Introduction* (Oxford 2000) and the chapters on Victorian Novelists in Terry Eagleton, *The English Novel* (London 2005).

Kommentar This seminar's objective is to explore the textual dimension of the British Empire. By reading and discussing a wide variety of fictional and non-fictional texts of the period (1840-1920), we will examine the extent to which imperialist ideology was discursively disseminated, colonial and colonialist ideas reflected in writing, and paradoxical situations as well as implicit criticism incorporated in the literature of the time.

Readings: Charlotte Brontë, *Jane Eyre* (1847) and E.M. Forster, *A Passage to India* (1924); short fiction and poetry by writers like Rudyard Kipling, Flora Annie Steel, Robert Louis Stevenson, Joseph Conrad, and Somerset Maugham; as well as non-fictional texts (taken from Elleke Boehmer, ed. *Empire Writing: An Anthology of Colonial Literature 1870-1918*). The selected novels ought to be read before classes start.

Kommentar Generically hybrid and thus the product of a coming together of different traditions, Victorian sensation fiction appealed to readers of various backgrounds and was hugely popular in the 1860s. The objective of this seminar is the exploration of those textual and contextual aspects that primarily contributed to this popularity, such as the mid-19th-century custom of serial publication, the merging of seemingly disparate genre-specific characteristics, and the contemporary controversial debates on sensation fiction.

As we will be preoccupied in the course with theoretical assessments of the genre (and as there will be continuous additional readings throughout the semester), students are expected to have read the four novels by the beginning of the term. There will be a quiz on them in the first meeting!

Kommentar

In this seminar we will look at new approaches to Romanticism – a period that was for a long time mainly known for its 'Big Six' poets (Blake, Byron, Coleridge, Keats, Shelley, Wordsworth), but which is currently being reconsidered as an age of diverse literary and cultural works. While traditional authors and canonical texts will be recurrently used as reference points, the main interest of the seminar lies in lesser known writers and non-canonical works of the period. For instance, we will investigate the role female authors played while also asking how the traditional concept of Romanticism is connected to working conditions and class affairs in late 18th and early 19th century Britain. Another focus will be put on the interaction between British Romanticism and international (literary) affairs, as well as on the importance of different media and genres for the development of what we know today as the Romantic period.

Students are expected to show a basic familiarity with the concept of Romanticism and with (some) canonical texts at the beginning of the seminar. Students should be willing to read and discuss not only primary works but also secondary sources and theoretical texts.

Kommentar

This course aims to introduce students to Atlantic history using one of its key themes: race. It seeks to provide an introduction not merely to broader frameworks of transnational history, but also to a range of methodological approaches in the study of social, cultural, political, and intellectual history. The course begins by looking at modern approaches to race and racism before charting ancient and medieval ideas. Moving to the Atlantic world, it focuses on the ways in which exotic peoples and lands were represented in European texts; a later session explores eighteenth-century representations of Pacific islanders as a counterpart to these earlier portrayals. The social history of early settlement, colonial exploitation, and the creation of new peoples (ethnogenesis) is examined in the following weeks. After this, sessions focus on the history of racial ideas as they related to religion, science (particularly biology), and society. The course then turns to examine the twin crises of revolution and abolitionism and their role in the development of racial ideas and practices in Europe and the Americas. The penultimate session explores the triumph of race throughout the Atlantic world before Darwin, and the concluding discussion explores some of the ways in which race paradoxically thrived following the demise of the ultimate racial institution: chattel slavery. A research-based approach to teaching and learning will be taken throughout, partly by drawing directly on the course leader's own research, and through a focus on the analysis of primary source material in each class.

Kommentar This is the first in a series of four lecture courses offered consecutively over a period of two years. It is designed to acquaint students with the literature and culture of North America from the late sixteenth- through the early nineteenth-centuries, i.e. the period of exploration and settlement, the American Revolution, the Early Republic, and the Age of Jackson. We will discuss some of the exemplary texts from these periods, analyzing their characteristic forms and themes as well as the history of their interpretation. Specific attention will be paid to key literary concepts, debates, and interpretive methodologies. We will also discuss important issues such as the role of religion in American culture and the separation of church and state; the theory and practice of federalism; enlightenment notions of commerce; slavery; western expansion; and the wars waged against Native American tribes. We will read examples of the sermon, epic, mock epic, occasional poetry; philosophical, religious, revolutionary, and anti-slavery tracts; travel narratives, captivity narratives, pamphlets, broadsides, dramas, speeches, letters; excerpts from early novels; and we will discuss contacts and exchanges between native and colonial cultures and the translation/

transcription of traditionally oral tales. Students should walk away from this course with a deeper understanding of the various cultural traditions and innovations that helped lead to new nationhood, and with knowledge of the first literature to self-consciously call itself American.

Kommentar

The two-semester lecture series aims at introducing students to major approaches, traditions, and key figures in the fields of cultural and media theory. The second part of the lecture series, "Approaches and Methods in Media Studies," will focus on media theory, visual culture, material culture and cultural studies. The lecture will be concerned with media history, the relation between (mass) media and society, media aesthetics, models of communication, and questions of cultural memory, technology, materiality and embodiment. Other relevant issues are medial configurations of time and space, networks and systems, concepts of hyperreality, postmodernity and the digital. We will also consider theories of single media: photography, the cinema, television, the computer and mobile media.

The lecture will introduce a number of key texts and major schools that have been influential in the development of critical media and cultural studies: The Toronto School, the Frankfurt School, German media theory, British Cultural Studies, theories of postmodernism and visual culture, film and television theory, theories of material culture, systems theory, and actor-network theory.

Key thinkers are Theodor W. Adorno, Walter Benjamin, Jean Baudrillard, Bill Brown, James Carey, Richard Dyer, John Fiske, Stuart Hall, Mark Hansen, Miriam Hansen, Donna Haraway, Katherine Hayles, Max Horkheimer, Harold Innis, Frederic Jameson, Friedrich Kittler, Bruno Latour, Marshall McLuhan, Jason Mittell, Laura Mulvey, John Durham Peters, Claude Shannon, Raymond Williams, and Geoffrey Winthrop-Young.

Kommentar

According to the *Oxford English Dictionary*, the term 'middlebrow' pertains to "a person [who is] only moderately intellectual [or] of average or limited cultural interests;" and a 'middlebrow' artistic work is one "of limited intellectual or cultural value; demanding or involving only a moderate degree of intellectual application, typically as a result of not deviating from convention." Middlebrow studies are concerned with literature of the 'middle' or the mainstream – ephemeral texts from the perspective of traditional literary history which, at their moment in time, made for solid best-sellers. Because of their very situatedness at what might be described as the WASP middle-class 'center' of culture, middlebrow texts have been marginalized in literary criticism until very recently. Are texts that are 'too popular', that sell 'too well' and that defy the categories of sophisticated 'highbrow' culture as well as those of an allegedly debased 'lowbrow' culture, then, "go-betweens," as Virginia Woolf claimed? Why is it still worthwhile reading and studying artefacts of the 'middle'? Why would it be wrong to assume that the middlebrow is a gendered endeavor, a genre by women for women? And in what respect is it problematic to work with the concept of 'center' and 'middle' in the first place?

In this class we will trace these questions as we approach the phenomenon of American middlebrow studies to see that these allegedly 'light' texts have performed important cultural work for a great number of American (middle-class) readers. Middlebrow texts to this day are steeped in 19th-century didacticism and function as guides to middle-class life, life-styles, and prosperity by eliciting strong affective responses from their readers. At the same time, though, middlebrow fiction and culture increasingly makes use of innovative techniques and unconventional themes. Thus, it defies and subverts the categories of mainstream and margin, and high and popular culture. We will read a variety of texts (mostly in the form of excerpts) which will be made available in a reader (via Stud.IP) at the beginning of the semester, but you are asked to purchase the following three novels: Grace Metalious's *Peyton Place*, Jonathan Franzen's *The Corrections* and Nella Larsen's *Quicksand*.

Kommentar

This course will explore some of the central texts of Transcendentalism, focusing on Emerson, Thoreau, Fuller, and others affiliated with *The Dial* and various reform movements. The emphasis will be on Emerson as the thinker that other writers had to come to terms with. His insistence that each individual has the ability, even the moral obligation, to define his own relation to nature will be the prism through which we consider Thoreau's retreat to Walden Pond, Fuller's vindication of the rights of women, and influential arguments against war and for abolition. This course will require students to grapple with sometimes dense philosophical texts, but it should also provide insight into some of the key concepts and issues informing what many scholars see as the American version of Romanticism.

Please acquire copies of Joel Myerson's edited anthology *Transcendentalism: A Reader* (Oxford UP, 2000) and, if possible, Jeffrey Cramer's annotated edition of Thoreau's *Walden* (Yale UP, 2004).

Registration: Attendance for this class is limited to 30 students. Binding (!) registration on Stud.IP between 01 September and 15 October is required. All news concerning this class will be posted on Stud.IP as well. The class will start in the first week of the semester. For final registration, participants need to attend the first session of class.

Kommentar

Short of the Bible itself, few texts were as influential on learned medieval thought as Boethius's *Consolation of Philosophy*. Small wonder: the events of the era read like living proof of the seemingly capricious upturns and downturns of fortune explained in the work. Alfred of Wessex came within an inch of losing his kingdom before it grew to encompass all of England; Geoffrey Chaucer survived the Black Death that killed half his compatriots before he reached ten years of age. Both men were so impressed by the sixth-century treatise on fortune that they chose to make it available in English prose.

Even so, the late ninth-century Alfredian translation of *The Consolation of Philosophy* was not England's first encounter with the concepts of fate, fortune, providence, and free will. By the time of its production, Anglo-Saxons had already spent three centuries integrating Christian thought into the very heart of their culture, which involved the absorption of sophisticated views on all these concepts against the background of the transience/eternity dichotomy. Moreover, literary evidence suggests that the Anglo-Saxons had a robust tradition of fate that thrived prior to and/or alongside Christianity. In this seminar, accordingly, we will study a variety of Anglo-Saxon expressions of the degree to which life on earth is predetermined, brutish, and short.

Texts we will read include a full modern translation of Boethius's Latin *Consolation of Philosophy*, as well as excerpts from its Old English prose and verse translations. In addition, we will read from the elegies, homilies, *Beowulf*, and some comparative material from Tacitus and Old Norse literature. Students will improve their reading proficiency of Old English prose and verse, but they will also gain an understanding of the philosophical and theological concepts of free will, predestination, and salvation theology.

****Please note: this course has a substantial language component!**** Students will train their understanding of Old English, and some engagement with the original language will be part of both the exam and the paper assessment.

Kommentar A global simulation is a task-based teaching method which gives learners the opportunity to experience and use the foreign language in a fictitious but real-life scenario. By making use of different creative methods, material and media an authentic space is created – this can for example be an island, a different country, a village, a zoo, a circus, a house, a company, or in our case an award ceremony in Hollywood, – in which the participants take over different roles and master various communicative situations and tasks.

In this course you will learn about the potential a global simulation has to offer for the context of foreign language learning. You will also learn how to plan and develop a global si-

mulation based on a textbook unit on Hollywood and get the chance to put your ideas into practice.

In cooperation with different secondary schools we will design and carry out a simulation project at the YLAB and invite 8th grade students to join us in this creative adventure. There, pupils will enter the foreign language context we designed for them, including a specific time and place and take over new identities. Following different rules and instructions they will interact with each other, read documents they may find, write notes to each other, solve problems, create and explore. The aim is that you, of course also in role, motivate and encourage the students to actively use the foreign language and support them in doing so.

There will be a preparation at school (probably consisting of three project days) prior to the simulation project. The simulation projects themselves will be carried out on a Tuesday or Wednesday morning (8.00-12.30). Both the preparation at school and the simulation project will be part of your internship.

Moreover you will learn how to do your own research project during your internship including methods and instruments which will help you to answer the research question which we developed in the context of the course.

Students initially have the opportunity to reflect on the concept of teaching reading as more than a receptive skill. By engaging with and creating hands-on and production-type activities, tasks and material, they will be challenged to apply a competence-oriented approach to the teaching of reading. The overall aim is to help students consider how they can research settings in which such an approach to reading is implemented to determine how the learning experience can be characterized. Methods of empirical learning and teaching research will also be covered in the course to enable students to evaluate their own teaching in the *Forschungspraktikum*.

Kommentar Genre-based teaching has a long tradition in the English speaking world. It is employed in fields as diverse as academic writing at American universities, ESP classes (English for Special Purposes) in Britain and ESL classes (English as a Second Language) in Australia. Having entered the German discussion fairly recently (Hallet 2007), concepts of genre-based scaffolding in the fields of writing and speaking are still being developed.

We will deal with spoken and written genres in this course, grouped into *real world genres* (from birthday cards to applications), *academic genres* (from summaries to essays), and *literary genres* (from fables to dramatic monologues). You will develop and present a teaching unit that is dealing with a genre of your choice and you will get the chance to test parts of it on your fellow students. In the process you will become a competent user of a few new genres yourself.

Kommentar For readers of all ages picture books have been the first port of call to the literary world. Correspondingly, picture books have long been recognized as a suitable starting point for early literary reading in a foreign language. With picture narratives like comics or graphic novels students can continue this journey into the world of multimodal storytelling.

The didactic potential of picture narratives has been discussed in contexts as varied as cross-curricular learning (Niemann 2002), intercultural learning (Burwitz-Melzer 2004), visual literacy (Enever 2006, Lütge 2011, Stafford 2011) or learner empowerment (Bland 2013). However, lofty aims remain a lip service if working with picture books is not based on solid foundations. Therefore the course primarily aims at developing your understanding of the genre and your acquaintance with individual books. We will discuss several examples of picture books that can be used for different age groups and assess the texts' potential to become resources for learning. Only then can we explore how they can be used to train key competences of ELT.
