



Education in Asceticism and Monasticism: Contents, Agents, Institutions and Processes

A workshop with the title "Education in Asceticism and Monasticism: Contents, Agents, Institutions and Processes" will take place within the sub-projects C04 and C05 of the Collaborative Research Centre 1136 "Education and Religion" from December 15-16, 2016. <u>The location is the library at Nikolausberger Weg 23, Göttingen.</u>

The workshop is aiming at the scientific exchange of current research projects in Germany and Sweden. In Lund, Sweden, there is a fruitful patristic environment, and a project has recently been conducted there with the title "Early Monasticism and Classical Paideia". We have invited Swedish colleagues to join us for this workshop to benefit from their findings and ongoing projects. In Göttingen we are currently dealing with themes that also touch upon *paideia* and monasticism, as Christoph Birkner is investigating catechetical teaching (Subproject C05) and, in his PhD, the monastic hagiography of Cyril of Scythopolis, and Maria Munkholt is investigating the role of Christian teachers in Late Antiquity, in particular female ascetics as teachers (Subproject C04). The workshop is meant to offer us an opportunity for a common consideration on education and religion in the ascetical and monastic context of Late Antiquity.
