**APPLICATION OF CBD AND NAGOYA PROTOCOL IN RESEARCH COLLABORATION –  
DRAFTING PROCESS FOR INDIVIDUAL PROJECTS: RESEARCH PERMIT, COUNTERPART  
AGREEMENT, COLLECTION PERMIT AND MATERIAL TRANSFER AGREEMENT**

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Abstract:

The Convention of Biodiversity (CBD) is a multilateral treaty with three main goals: (1) The conservation of biological diversity, (2) the sustainable use of its components and (3) the fair and equitable sharing of benefits arising from genetic resources (Nagoya Protocol). As an interdisciplinary german-indonesian basic research consortium, the CRC990/EFForTS project is tasked with implementing the legislative framework of the CBD/Nagoya Protocol in its research collaboration.

In this presentation, I will elaborate on the four pillars on which the CRC990/EFForTS consortium tries to adhere to the legal framework provided by CBD/Nagoya Protocol as well as german and Indonesian law: (1) Research Permit application/approval by RISTEK, (2) Counterpart Agreements between German and Indonesian Principal Investigators, (3) Collection Permit Application, Recommendation and Approval by LIPI/PHKA, and (4) Material Transfer Agreements between German and Indonesian Principal Investigators.

I will focus on the practical side of the implementation, i.e. present the key concepts of the aforementioned documents, their drafting process as well as their practical benefits and limitations. I will further present other practical sides of Access/Benefit-Sharing methods, such as the collaboration with local staff and students and the transfer of knowledge/technology.
