Summary of requirement in terms of credit points

18C : three compulsory lectures + tutorials in Development Economics 6C : one compulsory modules in Econometrics, either Econometrics I or II

12C : two (out of four) mandatory specialization modules in your field of specialization (Economics or Agricultural Economics)

36C : six further elective compulsory courses, among them 1 compulsory seminar 5 elective compulsory modules

18C : three electives to chose among all modules of the two faculties [ECON, QUANT, SIA identification in module codes)

One semester abroad, not required for international students Instead of semester abroad, a field study is possible; not required for international students but possible = 15 modules (90C) + 20week Master Thesis (30C)



Important requirements in terms of CP

- The course work (90 CP = 15 modules * 6 CP) can be optimally done in 3 semesters (super-fast students) or in 4 to 5 semesters
- However, please note that the course work must have been accomplished at the beginning of your 6th semester (Fachsemester; holiday semesters do not count) after the re-sit exams have taken place (in your case: April 2025!). If you are below 90 CP in your course work, you will be ex-matriculated and not be able to obtain your degree in MSc Development Economics.



Important requirements in terms of CP

Hence, we suggest the following:

- Get done with your course work in your 5th semester (latest)
- Plan your internships for the time after you have completed your course work & before you start writing your master thesis
- The master thesis (30 CP, 20 weeks) can be written thereafter whenever it suits you. No ex-matriculation will occur but tuition fees (Langzeitstudiengebühren) might increase for long-term students (Langzeitstudenten)

Teaching

- Format
 - Lectures
 - (Practicals)
 - Tutorials
 - Seminars
- Each lecturer decides on how to organize their lecture themselves
- Check syllabus & announcements in Stud.IP



Teaching: Seminars

- Block seminars and seminars with weekly sessions
- Not advisable to take seminars (esp. block seminars) in your first semester
- Take 1-2 seminars before you start writing your thesis



Stay abroad

- Germans and foreigners with a German education must study abroad for one semester at a partner university
- Exemption: Bachelor certificate with at least 18 credits obtained during an exchange semester
- Alternative: field work abroad related to master thesis



Semester abroad (not required for international students)

- Should be planned for 3rd or 4th semester
- Plan sufficient time for preparation: Deadlines usually in December / January for a stay starting in August/September/October
- Uni-wide programs and specific exchange programs of the faculty
 - Some scholarships are tied to EU or German citizenship

 - Info meetings in November
- Not possible for students with EPOS scholarship (and most other DAAD funding)

Semester abroad (not required for international students)

- Choice of more than 60 different universities
- Students may apply for the following programmes:
 - Exchange programme with the Stellenbosch University, South Africa
 - Exchange programme with universities in Latin America (for example Colombia, Brazil, Mexico) & the Caribbean (SALISES, Trinidad and Tobago)
 - Exchange programme with universities in Asia (for example China, India, and South Korea, Indonesia)
 - European Exchange Programmes ERASMUS , e.g. University of Florence; University of Clermont Auvergne, University of Lund, University of Groningen



Field study

- Usually: student assistant in a data collection
- Research projects of staff of the Development Economics group of the university or of other research institutes
- Mostly only expenses covered
- Difficult to plan, opportunities come spontaneously
- To fulfil the requirement of the mandatory stay abroad, the field work should be related to the master thesis



Internships

- One internship can be included as Elective module (6 CP, no grade)
 - Internship must be related to master program
 - Duration of at least 170 hours
 - Approval process (<u>detailed info</u>):
 - Apply for it at the dean of studies, at least 6 weeks ahead of planned start of internship to get pre-approval, provide plan for internship
 - After completion of internship provide report & certificate of employer

Has to be approved by Prof. Vollmer / Prof. Fuchs to earn credit points

- International students: mind visa regulations!
- Not possible for students in a Double Degree program



Double Degree programs

- Three double degree programs
 - o Stellenbosch University, South Africa
 - University of Florence, Italy
 - University of Clermont Auvergne, France
- Some slots still available
- Interested students must join the mandatory info meeting tomorrow!



Major features of our MSc DE program

- MSc program offers a lot of freedom: Seven "pre-determined" courses & eight courses that can be elected from a large number of options
- The work-load seems small but a lot of independent study is required!
- Attendance of classes is neither checked nor enforced but indispensable!
- Often only 1 final exam (counts 100%) at the end of each lecture!
- Independent scientific work: Reading & understanding proposed literature, writing seminar papers & a 20-week MSc thesis
- We recommend to take 4-5 courses per semester and to earn (optimally) 24-30 credits per semester



Idea of students

- Interested
- Eager to learn, motivated
- Independent
- Responsible
- Fair
- Cooperative
- Honest



Exams : What will be on the exam??

- No lecturer will tell you the exam questions before-hand
- During lectures and tutorials professors emphasize certain aspects (listen carefully!)
- If professors talk about exams, they will do so in front of ALL students (equal treatment policy)
- The ASTA / Fachschaft usually collects OLD exams; prepare by the help of these exams



Exams: How to prepare for them??

- Start already during the semester with the preparation
- Going through the power point slides is NOT enough!
- Read the related literature carefully. Take notes!
- Go through the exercises in the tutorials
- Test critically whether you can solve the exercises without help
- Work with old exam questions
- Think of new exam questions
- Form study groups



Exams: Important regulations

- In order to earn CREDIT POINTS and GRADES you have to register in **FlexNow**
- You have 3 attempts to pass a course. The 3rd time you have to pass!!!
 If you do not pass a compulsory course, you will be exmatriculated!
- If you are registered for an exam, it counts as an attempt, whether or not you show up!
- Deregister if you do not want to take the exam
- Improvement of grades is NOT possible. If you obtain e.g. a 3.0/3.3/3.7/4.0, you pass but you cannot take a second attempt. The first attempt counts 100%!
 Prepare well for compulsory courses.



Register for your exams : FlexNow

- Different rules for registration depending on type of course and examination
- Written Exam : Usually until one week before the exam
- Seminar Paper : Sometimes upon registration for the seminar, sometimes until one week after the introductory meeting, sometimes until one week prior to the first submission deadline
- Courses with exam but additional homework/paper : Can vary, but make sure to check!



Deregistering / Not able to attend

- You can also deregister from FlexNow in a given time period, for exams until 24 hours before
- If you are sick and don't feel able to attend the exam:
 - Don't attempt it
 - Get a medical certificate from the doctor
 - Hand in the certificate with the WiWi Prüfungsamt
