Health insurance = compulsory Health insurance for international students	It is compulsory in the Netherlands to have medical insurance. All foreign students have to arrange for their own health insurance (your current insurance might also be valid in the Netherlands, so check that first), third-party liability insurance and/or baggage insurance. Language of instruction: English	The language of instruction is English . Students who speak Dutch fluently can also take a number of law courses in the Dutch language (to be discussed upon arrival with the exchange officer).
Language assessment Required level of English proficiency With level B2 students can only take bachelor level courses Master level courses require at least level C1.	Students are expected to have a command of the English language suitable for the level of study, and the Law Faculty/International Office reserves the right to deny admission into courses if the English language level of the student might impede progress for other students. ► The Law Faculty Groningen does not require an official English language test yet, but will need confirmation from the partner institution that their nominated students have at least level B2 (for bachelor courses) or level C1 (for master courses).
Master level CI. Master level courses may also have special entry requirements	Additional remarks for students whose native language is not English: -The Faculty of Law-Groningen wants to emphasize that a level of English similar to <u>B2 is the minimum requirement</u> if students want to follow bachelor law courses and pass exams. We expect incoming exchange students to have at least this B2

	level, and we ask their home university to confirm the student's level.
	Required level of English for our law courses: <u>for bachelor level courses in Law (indicated by B):</u> minimum level is B2 (CEFR) or score 82 for the TOEFL or score 6.0 in the IELTS <u>for master level courses in Law (indicated by Ba/Ma or M):</u> required level is C1 (CEFR) or score 92 for the TOEFL or score 6.5 in the IELTS ba/Ma courses have end of bachelor/first phase master level Native speakers are exempt from this requirement. CEFR= Common European Framework of Reference for Languages; this system is often used in Europe TOEFL=Test of English as a Foreign Language IELTS = International English Language Testing System
Level of law courses for incoming students	 The faculty offers law courses at: Bachelor level – B1, B2 and B3 (number refers to the year of Law study) Ba/Ma level – end of bachelor/first phase master level Master level – for advanced law students; at master level (4th year law students; sometimes also end of 3rd year law students). Note: not all bachelor and master level courses are open to exchange students. Please ask the International Office . The Law Faculty offers very few law courses at 2nd year bachelor level. Therefore we can only accept exchange students who have <i>finished at least two years of law studies</i> when they arrive in Groningen.
	Some of the law courses on offer do not require a specific law background, and are therefore also open to non-law exchange students (=a limited list). Other law courses have specified prerequisites which must be met. See course descriptions. Important : students who want to take specialised courses in International law or European law are expected to already have done a basic course in these law fields (either at home or in Groningen). If that is not the case, then no advanced courses in these law fields can be taken. For very specialised courses like e.g. Company Law and International Corporate Insolvency Law (LLM courses), students must have already studied company law at home/have a company law background. Learning, Teaching, and (types of)	 The standard workload for a semester is 30 EC. Most courses consist of general lectures, sometimes with additional working groups. Some courses are offered in the form

Examinations	of a seminar.
	 Assessment is done either by written exams, oral exams or exams in the form of a paper, and sometimes a paper in combination with a presentation in class or oral exam. Detailed information is given in the (digital) study and information guide for international students, and also during the first lecture of a course. Handwrite your exams	programmes/exchange/courses
Dyslexia	 NOTE: written exams are made <u>handwritten</u>, so not typewritten. Students who cannot handwrite their exams must ask special permission from the Board of Examiners and must show a doctor's statement or proof of similar arrangements from their home university. Requests must be made well in advance. See also the digital study guide (via the Student Portal > Faculty Tools > Law Knowledgebase) NOTE: students with dyslexia who have special exam arrangements at home, should write a timely request to the Board of Examiners if they need similar exam arrangements during their exchange period in Groningen.
Important: Independent way of studying and Preparation for exams	Not all courses have working groups or tutorials, so students are expected to be able to arrange their own study schedule, and make their own study plan for the semester. This 'independent study' atmosphere in our Faculty might

Assistance with making a workable study schedule can be offered by the International Office, and by the Study Support Crew of the University's Student Service Centre – they can offer

Information package	Upon arrival all incoming students will receive an information package from the International Office. This will include a.o. the
Groningen student card Groningen email account	RuG student card (if already available), thesis and paper guidelines, information on health care, the library, sports facilities, and other useful information.

	 The Groningen/RuG e-mail address, initial password and student number will be sent digitally to the incoming exchange students after the faculty has registered them, so that the students can immediately use their Groningen student account once they have activated it. Students will also receive instructions (by e-mail) on how to upload their photograph for their Groningen student card, so that their card is ready upon arrival. We urge students to upload their photograph immediately after receiving the instruction email. The Groningen/RuG student card can be used for student identification, entrance to the exam, for printing, copying, coffee, etc. Once students are in Groningen, the Faculty of Law will only use the Groningen email account for communication with the students. So students should check their Groningen email account regularly.
