My name is Juan Pablo Mora, agronomist, graduated from SIA program Organic Agriculture in 2015. I decided to study agronomy with the idea to improve small farmers livelihoods in Mexico, where most of them live in poverty. After my bachelor´s degree, working with farmers I realized that only a few farmers succeed economically, but with a high environmental and social cost. Degraded soil, loss of biodiversity, contaminated food, and environment. In 2005 I started involving myself in organic agriculture, at this moment began my journey to change my conventional agriculture mindset where all is based using external inputs, like fertilizers and pesticides. Until now, I understand why soil health, biodiversity, and local consumption, are the basis to regenerate our food system. It has been a long and hard unlearning process where every day I learn and surprise myself of the possibilities that agriculture based on nature offers.

In 2017 I decided to start a mix farm model with educational purposes for Aguascalientes citizens. It was visited by thousands of school students. We also gave training related with urban agriculture. For me it is clear, that nothing is going to change if people do not understand how agriculture affect their daily lives and the availability of basic goods like healthy food, clean air, and water. Only when citizens understand and demand it, farmers will improve their practices.

Due to financial constraints, I ended farm activities two years later, however, my enthusiasm and activity promoting regenerative agriculture was not stopped. Now, I am working in Vitalis Organic Seeds, happy to work closely with organic farmers in Central Mexico.

## Feature Story: James Thompson (SIA Alumni 2006)

Watching the shadow patterns cast by the date palm canopy in the ancient oasis of Al Ula my thoughts take me back to the palm groves of the Al Hajjar Mountains of Oman where, together with my fellow students from Witzenhausen and Goettingen, I received my introduction to the historic agricultural systems of the Arabian Peninsula. These remnant examples of traditional agriculture have prevailed at a time when modernity has fostered the degradation of so many unique agricultural landscapes and associated communities throughout the world. I sense that here in Al Ula, about 300 KM north of the city of Medina in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, our project to regenerate the wadi oasis, that has the UNESCO heritage site of Hegra as its centre piece, has been initiated just in time to preserve the oasis and the reservoir of genetic material that it supports.

The older farmers of Al Ula have been struggling to preserve their cultural life at a time when the younger generation has been lured away from the traditional oasis by the promise of greater economic prosperity derived from larger scale irrigated agriculture development projects in adjacent areas of the Governorate. Now, as the previously isolated Kingdom of Saudi Arabia opens to tourism, a new community vision that celebrates traditional culture and the monuments of past civilisations has led to a commitment by the Royal Commission for Al Ula to preserve and share this cultural landscape. This is the first time since my days as an IOA student in Witzenhausen, between 2006 to 2008, that I feel that I am working with colleagues who share an understanding of agriculture as an ecological system in a project mandated to regenerate a cultural landscape with agriculture as its foundation.

This rare opportunity to work as part of a like-minded group may be a familiar story to many of us who are linked together through the SIA Alumni network who have pursued careers outside the academic community and the European sphere of influence. We commit ourselves to careers that promote sustainable agriculture yet find that the opportunities to really make a difference are so often compromised by the economic rationale of conventional agricultural and the interests of organisations that sponsor agricultural development or business. So my current role in Saudi Arabia is certainly one that I have been looking forward to, although it is in a location that I least expected to find myself.

It was always a fascination to me as a youth in south-eastern Australia that the abundant natural world of forests and coastal heathlands was so productive without the intervention of humans when compared to the dairy farming lands that surrounded me. I felt concerned that the so-called formula of success for local farms involved the application of agricultural inputs that were considered so harmful – yet, as I was instructed, so necessary – that I had to wear protective clothing and breathing apparatus for the handling and application of these materials... continued next page

I often wondered what impact these substances were having on the agricultural environment, although these thoughts were largely set aside in the contentment of our rural lifestyle and the beauty of the natural environment that spread endlessly around us.

It was not until a few years later when I travelled to East Africa that I met farmers who seemed to have a completely natural understanding of the precious relationships between themselves, their farming activities and the environment. I was not to know that my time spent with traditional farming communities on Mount Kenya during the months of the coffee harvest would have a profound influence on the direction of my life and lead me to work in horticulture estate management for a period of 7 years during a time of great political and social change in Kenyan society. My work in Kenya enabled me to develop my horticultural production skills in a commercial agriculture environment and at the same time provided me with an opportunity to learn so much about traditional cultures and agricultural practices.

Following my return to Australia to work in the horticulture industry, I was searching for an organic agriculture consultant to contribute to one of my projects when I found that the University of Sydney was offering courses in ecological agriculture. Here I saw an opportunity to develop my knowledge and understanding of all that I had learned and observed during my work and travels in many parts of the world. This set me on a most rewarding academic sojourn of study and travel that eventually led me to Witzenhausen to undertake my M.Sc. IOA.

It was one of life's great privileges to be part of the Witzenhausen community – to be guided, challenged and encouraged in my personal growth, my thinking and awareness by such an inspiring group of academics and fellow students. My thesis research with Prof. Dr. Andreas Buerkert in the Department of Organic Crop Production and Agro-ecosystem Research in the Tropics and Sub-tropics (OPATS), involved a study of homegardens along the Nile River in Urban and Peri-urban Khartoum in Sudan. This experience, together with value chain and organic certification courses that I participated in at DITSL, set me on a pathway to a post-graduate career in consulting and project management. My work that has been mostly focussed on managing projects for the development of small-scale horticulture production systems and value chain development has taken me to interesting, and sometimes challenging, locations including Papua New Guinea, Cambodia, the Western Ghats of Maharashtra, Abu Dhabi and most recently here in Saudi Arabia.

When asked how I managed to find my way into these varied life experiences, I really am lost for a logical answer! However it has been a pathway of progressive enlightenment as one experience created the opportunity for the next. The sum of my experiences has greatly contributed to my sense of wellbeing and fulfilled my aim of playing a part in improving the livelihoods for agricultural communities and the sustainability of their farming systems.

Hola chiquillos! During the SIA master, I decided to go for the double degree offered by the University of Talca. I gave my time in lockdown some thought and came to the conclusion that I actually made a ton of new experiences even though they might not be very instagramable. I learned some lessons along the way, which I would like to share with you.
