Kommentar

Our current conceptions of nature and the natural are strongly, though for many of us unconsciously, influenced by late 18th-century and early 19th-century writing about nature, most prominently by the work of Romantic writers who began to draw stark distinctions between nature and civilization in the wake of industrialization. The Romantics turned towards nature for various purposes, inscribing their subjectivity and autobiographies, political convictions, scientific endeavours, and aesthetic beliefs into the landscapes they described and shaped through their texts. They were great travellers and their descriptions of foreign landscapes are inflected by a variety of factors, such as their imagination and the aesthetics of the sublime, the beautiful and the picturesque, but also by their Britishness, gender, class and political convictions. Moreover, the debates of the time display the reali-

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sation that human interventions upon nature could cause climate change whereas the polar controversy of 1818 illustrates a keen awareness of the impact of climate on human life. All in all, Romanticism invented a way of writing about nature that still influences the way we think of nature and what is natural today.

Late 18th-century writers did not make a clear-cut distinction between poetry and scientific writing about nature. Thus, Erasmus Darwin composed his botanical treaty *The Botanic Garden* (1791) in verse, activating an entire school of botanical writing by women to whom the study of plants was more accessible than other emergent branches of science.

Probably the most influential single piece of nature writing in late 18th century is Gilbert White"s *The Natural History of Selborne* (1788) which inspired the Romantic poets and later Charles Darwin and which has recently been translated into German. In aesthetic terms, the concepts that dominated nature writing were those of the picturesque, the beautiful and the sublime, the distinction of which was key in the aesthetic debates of the time despite the difficulties of trenchant definitions. The works of Edmund Burke (*A Philosophical Enquiry into the Origin of our Ideas of the Sublime and the Beautiful*, 1757), William Gilpin (*Three Essays: On Picturesque Beauty, on Picturesque Travel; and on Sketching Landscape*, 1792,) and Uvedale Price (*An Essay on the Picturesque, as Compared with the Sublime and the Beautiful*, 1794) sought to bring clarity to the subject and they will also help us to understand and interpret Romantic nature writing not only from our contemporary perspective but through the lens of late 18th-century aesthetics.

We shall read these works in excerpts as well as a plethora of other Romantic descriptions of nature in poetry and prose which will be provided closer to the start of the term. All reading is obligatory. Attendance in the first session is obligatory.

This is a 201 course whose aim is threefold. First, it seeks to familiarize students with the selected texts and their reception as well as to locate the texts in their literary and historical context. Furthermore, it introduces students to academic research and writing; and, finally, it encourages students to be critical thinkers themselves with a view to writing their first academic paper in English literature. It is essential that students do all the reading and attend regularly and actively.

In this course we will examine how different stage settings - backdrop, props, clothes and accessories, music, lighting - influence the audience perception. 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Kommentar

The spatial turn and the studies on the representation of space in literature that ensued from it invite us to regard texts as more than a mimetic representation of reality. Literature significantly shapes the way we understand the space we inhabit as well as sharpening our view of our environment. At the same time, space itself is constituted in our experience and becomes inflected by our social organisation and interactions, identities, and subjectivity. The space that forms the focus of this seminar is the city of London and we concern ourselves with its representation in poetry from the 18th century until today.

We shall start with a look at the early 18th century when the emergence of public spaces such as coffee houses generated new forms of interaction and engagement which become reflected in the preferred genre of the time, the satire, for instance in the poems of Jonathan Swift which we shall read against the backdrop of William Hogarth's engravings. The second group of poems stems from the pens of Romantic poets, especially William Blake, whose *Songs of Innocence and Experience* we study here. We place a strong focus on Modernism beginning with Thomas Hardy's poems and focussing on T.S. Eliot and W.H. Auden. We then turn our attention to postcolonial poems for the later 20th century and finish the class with a closer look at the project that was launched in 1986 and has continued ever since, *Poems on the Underground*.

A reader containing the primary, secondary and theoretical texts for this class will be provided closer to the start of the term. You are also requested to purchase a copy of the verse novel, *Lara*, by Bernardine Evaristo. All reading is obligatory. Attendance in the first session is obligatory.

Kommentar

Scottish migration has shaped the national history of Canada to a great extent, but it also has to be contextualized within a transatlantic framework and British history, for instance as part of the conflicts over imperial expansion in North America between Britain and France. The Scots arrived early in Canada setting up the colony of Nova Scotia in 1622, most of them Catholics fleeing persecution. Later, 18th-century Scottish immigrants were mainly evicted farmers, victims of the Highland Clearances who settled down in Upper Canada (roughly today"s Ontario), Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton Island (Nova Scotia). The 19th century saw the establishment of Scottish settlements on Prince Edward Island and in Manitoba as well as a rise in immigration numbers. The preferred destinations of these Presbyterian, English-speaking immigrants were Quebec and Ontario.

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A large number of renowned Scottish-Canadian writers have engaged creatively with Scottish history and immigration in their works. They tell stories of emigration and arrival, and of the communal and individual struggles involved in building news homes and establishing new identities. They delve into myth and tradition, and into the Scottish past in order to explain the Canadian present. The works we shall deal with are located in the Maritimes, Ontario and Manitoba and were written by prominent Canadian authors of novels and short stories. Our reading list includes Margaret Laurence, *The Diviners* (1974), Alistair Macleod, *No Great Mischief* (1999) and Alice Munro, *The View from Castle Rock* (2006), along with a list of shorter texts which will be provided via Stud.IP. Please get your own copies of all required reading and do the reading before the start of the Summer School.

Kommentar

London is not only the capital of England and the imperial center of the former British Empire, but also (arguably) *the* capital of modern literature. This lecture series will give an overview over literature of and about London from the early modern period to the present

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moment, with a strong emphasis on the 19th to the 21stcenturies. Through a series of readings, we will explore how changing demographics, spatial expansion, or developments in housing and infrastructure have not only reshaped the city but also the literary genres and forms that emerge from it. Therefore, literary history must be read alongside urban and cultural history throughout our lecture. Among other things, we will look at genres such as city comedy, the realist novel, the modernist poem, and at cultural and historical phenomena such as literary cultures of the city, sanitary reform, public housing, or the neoliberal reorganization of public space over the last four decades. The theoretical perspectives that we will take will include Marxism, gender studies, spatial theory, transcultural and postcolonial studies, and eco-criticism. The authors treated in this lecture - some in full length, others in short excerpts - will include, among others, Ben Jonson, Samuel Pepys, Charles, Dickens, George Gissing, Virginia Woolf, Jean Rhys, Iris Murdoch, Samuel Selvon, Zadie Smith, and A.L. Kennedy.

Please note that this lecture requires extensive reading for all modules attached to it. A (partial) reading list will be made available one month before the beginning of term, so that participants may begin their reading during the term break.

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Kommentar

In 1957 Ian Watt (1917-1999) published his landmark study, The Rise of the Novel: Studies in Defoe, Richardson and Fielding, a veritable discourse maker in literary studies, which has given rise to lively debates regarding his main claims as well as the texts and authors chosen for his examination. Watt principally suggests that the appearance of the early 18th-century novels by these authors marked a turning point in the development of fictional writing, which broke with the tradition of the epic by relying on realism and protagonists who were identifiable as everyday people with an individual consciousness and experiences. The background of this transformation was built by the industrial revolution and its aftermath, mainly the emergence of the middle classes but also the increase in literacy which both led to a demand for literature rooted in everyday life, based on true experiences of individualized characters molded on real people. This suited the talents of such writers as the journalist Daniel Defoe who was a Dissenter and whose novel, Robinson Crusoe (1719), provided the sort of authenticity that readers of the time would have felt most attracted to. Others followed, thus setting up a tradition of the realist English novel which also includes Crusoe's Moll Flanders, and novels by Samuel Richardson, Henry Fielding, and Laurence Sterne. This narrative of the English novel has been challenged on several counts, the principal of which are Watt's foregrounding of realism as a quality of the novel and his canonization of some writers at the cost of their significant predecessors. With regard to the latter, scholars have taken Watt to task for ignoring the three female writers that allegedly formed the "Fair triumvirate of Wit" in late 17th - early 18th century and who had already authored novels in the English language, namely Aphra Behn, Delariviere Manley, and Eliza Haywood.

This course will include both Ian Watt's study and its reception, and a list of novels pertaining to the topic. The choice of texts is a difficult one, but students are requested to get their own copies of Ian Watt's *The Rise of the Novel* as well as *Oroonoko* by Aphra Behn, *Robinson Crusoe* by Daniel Defoe, *Pamela* by Samuel Richardson, and *Joseph Andrews* by Henry Fielding. All reading is obligatory and students are advised to start reading as soon as they have registered for the class. These texts are classics of English literature and various editions may be purchased (e.g., Norton, Broadview, Oxford World's Classics, Penguin, etc.). Please refrain from individual inquiries regarding the purchase of the novels. Attendance in the first session is obligatory.

Kommentar

London is not only the capital of England and the imperial center of the former British Empire, but also (arguably) the capital of modern literature. This lecture series will give an overview over literature of and about London from the early modern period to the present moment, with a strong emphasis on the 19th to the 21stcenturies. Through a series of readings, we will explore how changing demographics, spatial expansion, or developments in housing and infrastructure have not only reshaped the city but also the literary genres and forms that emerge from it. Therefore, literary history must be read alongside urban and cultural history throughout our lecture. Among other things, we will look at genres such as city comedy, the realist novel, the modernist poem, and at cultural and historical phenomena such as literary cultures of the city, sanitary reform, public housing, or the neoliberal reorganization of public space over the last four decades. The theoretical perspectives that we will take will include Marxism, gender studies, spatial theory, transcultural and postcolonial studies, and eco-criticism. The authors treated in this lecture - some in full length, others in short excerpts - will include, among others, Ben Jonson, Samuel Pepys, Charles, Dickens, George Gissing, Virginia Woolf, Jean Rhys, Iris Murdoch, Samuel Selvon, Zadie Smith, and A.L. Kennedy.

Please note that this lecture requires extensive reading for all modules attached to it. A (partial) reading list will be made available one month before the beginning of term, so that participants may begin their reading during the term break.

After Antoine Galland had published his translation of the *Arabian Nights* in 1704, Oriental tales, or fictional works set in Eastern countries, quickly became popular all over Europe. In Britain, the representation of the 'Orient' was more often based on the imagination than on real knowledge, and it served a number of sometimes conflicting purposes: it could be

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tied in with the rise of colonialism and notions of European superiority, it could express illicit desires and utopian fantasies, and it could also be a vehicle to critique British politics and the exploitation of the East. This course will introduce you to some famous and diverse examples of the 18th century British literary engagement with the 'Orient' set against Edward Said's theoretical concept of 'Orientalism'.

Kommentar

In this course we will examine how different stage settings - backdrop, props, clothes and accessories, music, lighting - influence the audience perception. We focus on Macbeth, and in particular on how his behaviour is seen and interpreted differently if the visual context is changed. We will use a range of ideas and theories about creating audience responses, staging and performance, and aspects of game-based learning to reflect not only on the function of producers and directors in a staging of the play, but also on how the audience can be guided to a particular perspective on the play's protagonist. This course may include playacting elements. It certainly expects students to be (somewhat) creataive.

This course will be in close collaboration with the Institute for Digital Humanities; our findings will feed directly into a project that develops scenarios in which users can experience the contrasts using VR technology (or just plain web-based apps). Students are cordially invited to concurrently take part in a Schlüsselkompetenzen module on digital storytelling (SK.DH.07) as the web-based/VR scenario will be built alongside the course.

Kommentar

Scottish migration has shaped the national history of Canada to a great extent, but it also has to be contextualized within a transatlantic framework and British history, for instan-

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ce as part of the conflicts over imperial expansion in North America between Britain and France. The Scots arrived early in Canada setting up the colony of Nova Scotia in 1622, most of them Catholics fleeing persecution. Later, 18th-century Scottish immigrants were mainly evicted farmers, victims of the Highland Clearances who settled down in Upper Canada (roughly today"s Ontario), Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton Island (Nova Scotia). The 19th century saw the establishment of Scottish settlements on Prince Edward Island and in Manitoba as well as a rise in immigration numbers. The preferred destinations of these Presbyterian, English-speaking immigrants were Quebec and Ontario.

A large number of renowned Scottish-Canadian writers have engaged creatively with Scottish history and immigration in their works. They tell stories of emigration and arrival, and of the communal and individual struggles involved in building news homes and establishing new identities. They delve into myth and tradition, and into the Scottish past in order to explain the Canadian present. The works we shall deal with are located in the Maritimes, Ontario and Manitoba and were written by prominent Canadian authors of novels and short stories. Our reading list includes Margaret Laurence, *The Diviners* (1974), Alistair Macleod, *No Great Mischief* (1999) and Alice Munro, *The View from Castle Rock* (2006), along with a list of shorter texts which will be provided via Stud.IP. Please get your own copies of all required reading and do the reading before the start of the Summer School.

Kommentar

Are you interested in the history of English literature? If you are a BA student, this course expects you to have completed module B.EP.202 Anglophone Literature and Culture II as a prerequisite. MA students usually have covered periods in English literary history in their previous degree programme. Are you now hooked on - or at least interested in - knowing more about English literature, its key texts, key authors and what makes them canonical? This self-study unit is designed to broaden and deepen your knowledge of two periods in the history of English literature with the help of books on literary history and anthologies. (Students taking the SSU for B.WLI.131.1 cover only one period.) In particular, you will get a good overview of each period you are tackling, with in-depth information on what shapes

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the period itself, on authors and their texts, and on the developments within genres. At the same time you will experience that books on history are nothing to be afraid of - indeed, they can be positively enjoyable. (Not all of them are, but we will skirt around the ones that are extremely boring, prosy or ancient!)

Note that this is a self-study unit. It expects students to work on their own, or in groups of two or three students. It is <u>not</u> a course that is taught on a weekly basis though it is organized around tasks to be completed on a week-by-week basis. The unit expects quite an amount of self-discipline on the part of the participants - but fear not, it is structured in such a way as to help you cope with this if you are willing to put some work in!

Communication and feedback will be by email and in meetings whenever necessary. To ensure a good level of keeping contact, <u>students are expected to briefly update Dr. Reitemeier on their progress</u> (weeks 4, 8, 12, 18) if they want to complete the module.

Kommentar

Suburbia, a place so clean it *has* to be dirty. At least, that is the sneaking suspicion that roughly a century's worth of writing on this most American of spaces has planted firmly in our collective unconscious—that behind the immaculate façade of each white frame house, beneath the lush green grass of each pristine front lawn lies hidden some horrible secret, something truly and utterly disturbing. It is precisely these dark undercurrents of suburban life, this sinister quality first identified in *The Split-Level Trap* (1960) by the term "disturbia," that we will explore in this class.

In doing so, our aim is to further specify and complicate a subgenre of American writing that has tentatively been called "the suburban gothic," a genre label that has so far largely been applied to middle-class realist novels by white men who have, perhaps not unexpectedly, framed suburbia as a disturbingly white, middle-class, feminized space. This conventional perspective will serve as our starting point, and we will begin by considering how

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Richard Yates's classic suburban drama *Revolutionary Road* (1961) mostly adheres to it. From there on, however, we will branch out and examine the ways in which female writers and writers of color have adapted and, in some cases, subverted these genre conventions, first by going back a few years to Maude Hutchins's *Victorine* (1959) and its Lynchian take on sex and the suburbs, then to Gloria Naylor's hell-like vision of Black suburbia in *Linden Hills* (1985), and finally to Chang-Rae Lee's contemporary account of suburban life and mixed identity in *Aloft* (2004).

Ultimately, our goal will be to find out why it is that writers from such a wide range of different backgrounds keep returning, decade after decade, to the suburbs. What is it that makes suburbia so disturbing, so morbidly fascinating that it has given rise to an entire subgenre?

Kommentar

This class sets out to trace the project of Pearl S. Buck (1892-1973), a woman writer of worldwide recognition at her time who later on fell into oblivion.

Born as the daughter of American missionaries, Pearl Buck lived the first half of her life in a bilingual environment in China and spent the rest of her life travelling back and forth between the United States and Asia. She led a career that extended well beyond her eighty works of fiction and nonfiction and deep into the public (political) sphere. Passionately committed to the cause of social justice, Buck was active in the American civil rights and women's rights movements, and founded the first international adoption agency. Pearl Buck was an advocate of racial understanding and a vital cultural ambassador between the United States and China. Her socio-political activism made her one of the most interesting figures to influence American and Chinese cultural and literary history in the 20th century. Today, she is best known for her novel The Good Earth (1931), which won a Nobel Prize as well as a Pulitzer, but also the rest of her oeuvre is very much characterized by her attempt to create what might be called a distinct 'American China.'

In this class, we will discuss the project of this fascinating and controversial writer against the backdrop of its negotiation of diasporic experience, concepts of the 'self' and the 'other,' as well as its positioning in the context of middlebrow studies.

Class readings (such as excerpts and essays of Buck's project) will be provided in a reader at the beginning of the semester; but you need to purchase the three novels which we will read in full length. These are Pearl S. Buck's The Good Earth (Washington Square Press), East Wind, West Wind (Moyer Bell), and Kinfolk (Moyer Bell). Please note that while the editions listed here are preferred, other editions would be acceptable too.

Kommentar

In the context of mass extinction, loss of habitat and the commodification of nonhuman animals, literary texts are increasingly attempting to imagine the world from nonhuman perspectives. Within the emerging field of literary animal studies, which is concerned with the representation as well as the ethical and political implications of animals in literature, this class will consider how animal minds, emotions, perceptions, languages and cultures are presented in "convincing" ways.

Can the perspectives of animals ever be mediated by human languages? In which ways are other-than-human lifeways evoked? What might be the potentials but also the dangers of texts that employ animal narrators and focalizers? Focusing on fiction since the late twentieth century, we will discuss techniques and concepts such as literary perspective, defamiliarization, anthropomorphism and nonhuman agency in order to ask how and why the perspectives of nonhuman animals are imagined in literature and, moreover, how these texts engage with urgent human-animal concerns of our time.

Taking a historical perpective we will look at the influence of the American pacifist tradition—including writers such as Ballou and Thoreau—on the non-violent thought of Tolstoy and Gandhi, as well as Martin Luther King's interpretation of these sources as a central pillar of the 1960s civil rights movement. The extant body of Early Middle English writings is often eclipsed by the centuries-long engagement of academic and non-academic readers with Chaucer and his ilk. So much so that the relative paucity of original material has become part and parcel of a narrative of English oppression, linguistic and otherwise, by the French. In this course we shall challenge such broad narratives and study a selection of texts both with respect to linquistic developments as well as with the aim of a fair appreciation of their literary merits. Among the topics to be covered are the survival of written English and the ongoing copying of Old English texts, the shape of emergent Middle English, variation and variability of English against the multilingual backdrop of twelfth- and thirteenth-century England. Natural language processing is the interpretation and generation of human language by computational means. For living languages, this includes spoken or signed modes of communication as well as the written word, and large languages such as English or Mandarin have been so thoroughly modelled that we need only plug into a Google API to gain access to predictive text input, speech-to-text engines, grammar checks, and translation. By contrast, our access to premodern languages is primarily text-based, and what modest machine learning has been brought to bear on them has overwhelmingly favoured such larger languages as Latin. What few off-the-shelf libraries are available for the analysis of Old English, for instance, are limited and in great need of correction. The computational handling of these corpora accordingly takes us back to the basics: manipulating strings of text.

In this course, you will learn to deploy such Python libraries as NLTK, spaCy, and CLTK as well as the Python Standard Library and regular expressions to organize Modern English and Old English text and generate statistics on the basis of plaintext and XML text corpora. You will try your hand at tokenization, n-grams, stemming, lemmatization, and part-of-speech tagging, while learning key principles from the realms of linear algebra and machine learning along the way so you may develop an understanding of what separates the abilities of humans and machines to process language, and how to go about training a machine to help out with your research or other text-based projects.

The course assumes no prior knowledge of Python, algebra, or machine learning, and students in modules outside the English Department in particular are not expected to have a prior knowledge of Old English.

Drama techniques can be used in the foreign language classroom to design a communicative, creative, learner-centred, holistic and active learning environment. They train the students" communicative skills including the use of non-verbal language within a meaningful context, they foster cooperative learning and thus also help students to develop their social skills. They can be used in phases of intercultural learning, while working with literary texts and also in grammar or vocabulary exercises. Moreover, the use of drama and theatre in foreign language classrooms enables teachers to motivate, encourage and empower students to self-confidently use the foreign language. A great way to have students fully experience the potential of drama and theatre is the integration of theatre projects into foreign language teaching.

In this course we will experience and reflect on the use of drama techniques in different areas of foreign language learning. You will not only learn about theatre- and drama-pedagogical methods, games and principles, but also how to plan, organize and realize a theatre project with teenagers. This includes that we will go through the different phases of staging a theatre play ourselves.

To conduct the *Forschungspraktikum*, we will be offering a cooperation with the IGS Geismar in Göttingen. Here, you will have the chance to put into practice an EFL Drama Club (*Englisch-Theater-AG*) with IGS students on a weekly basis (2 hours/week). The EFL Drama Club will take place in the first half of the school term 22/23, starting from September 2022.

Similar to language itself, the teaching of language is also a constantly changing concept that has been influenced by the historical contexts. With an ongoing pandemic, the call for more innovations with various technologies in language classrooms is more urgent than ever. Technology can greatly assist in-person language instruction while also reshapes the interactions and teaching practices. A modern language teacher should be equipped with the knowledge about various technological possibilities in language instruction.

There will also be many hands-on opportunities for you to design teaching activities using different technologies individually or in groups. The main goal is to prepare you for the various technological offerings in real life so that you will be able to use them in most effective ways when teaching the English language.

Content and Language Integrated Learning (CLIL) takes place when students are taught non-lingual school subjects (e.g. History, sciences, PE and RE) in a foreign language. In German schools, English is by far the most frequently applied L2. CLIL aims at three goals at once: language awareness, content knowledge and intercultural competence. To grasp the (scientific) world through a second language means to enrich it through an additional perspective that is language-immanent.

In the course, you will get to know why, how and to what end CLIL is being taught. Theoretical concepts will be discussed (e.g. discourse functions, doppelte Sachfachliteralität) and practical ideas on how to cope with potential language barriers will be applied to content subject material (scaffolding). Students will get the chance to develop their own material and present it in class.

We will also look at the curricula to identify the subject contents that are best-suited for CLILpurposes and the students will eventually present ideas on how the chosen material and topic can be applied in a CLIL-classroom.

Kommentar

The Coronavirus pandemic plunged foreign language teachers and learners around the world into new, largely virtual or hybrid learning environments. At the same time, physical mobility programs, like student exchanges, came to a grinding halt. While virtual exchange (also known as telecollaboration) is by no means a direct replacement of such programs, they can still constitute a major, more inclusive, and less expensive facilitator of authentic communicative experiences - during pandemics and beyond.

Virtual exchange describes the practice of connecting learners with different linguistic and cultural backgrounds over extended periods of time via digital communication tools to foster language, digital, and cultural competences. The current scientific discourse highlights the potential of engaging these learners in truly collaborative projects in which they discuss complex global issues in order to achieve a common goal, e.g. O"Dowd"s Transnational Model of Virtual Exchange for Global Citizenship Education. As such, we will explore in what ways virtual exchange can also act as an effective practice to achieve the ambitious goals of global education.

Based on modern theories and practical recommendations, this course offers participants the opportunity to experience a virtual exchange in an English as a lingua franca environment hands-on. Together with pre-service EFL teachers from universities in Brazil, Israel, and Turkey, they will discuss global issues within the broader framework of the Sustainable Development Goals of the United Nations. In transnational teams, students will then develop and present complex competence tasks that can lend themselves for virtual exchanges in their future careers as EFL teachers in secondary education.

Be advised: If the pandemic restrictions allow it, the course will consist of a combination of sessions in the classroom on campus (especially in the beginning and at the end of the Semester: Sommer 2022 Datum: 14.02.2022

> semester) as well as virtual meetings via Zoom - as such, you will not be required to be in Göttingen for every single session. In addition, some meetings with our international partners may have to take place at different times. We will negotiate these dates together to ensure good fit for everyone. Finally, this class will be the research subject of a doctoral thesis. For this purpose, your interactions within the transnational teams will be screen-recorded. Of course, these recordings will be conducted for research purposes only and as such will not be made public.

For readers of all ages picture books have been the first port of call to the literary world. Correspondingly, picture books have long been recognized as a suitable starting point for early literary reading in a foreign language. With picture narratives like comics or graphic novels students can continue this journey into the world of multimodal storytelling.

The didactic potential of picture narratives has been discussed in contexts as varied as cross-curricular learning (Niemann 2002), intercultural learning (Burwitz-Melzer 2004), visual literacy (Enever 2006, Lütge 2011, Stafford 2011) or learner empowerment (Bland 2013). However, lofty aims remain a lip service if working with picture books is not based on solid foundations. Therefore the course primarily aims at developing your understanding of the genre and your acquaintance with individual books. We will discuss several examples of picture books that can be used for different age groups and assess the texts" potential to become resources for learning. Only then can we explore how they can be used to train key competences of ELT.

Kommentar

Suburbia, a place so clean it *has* to be dirty. At least, that is the sneaking suspicion that roughly a century's worth of writing on this most American of spaces has planted firmly in our collective unconscious—that behind the immaculate façade of each white frame house, beneath the lush green grass of each pristine front lawn lies hidden some horrible secret, something truly and utterly disturbing. It is precisely these dark undercurrents of suburban life, this sinister quality first identified in *The Split-Level Trap* (1960) by the term "disturbia," that we will explore in this class.

In doing so, our aim is to further specify and complicate a subgenre of American writing that has tentatively been called "the suburban gothic," a genre label that has so far largely been applied to middle-class realist novels by white men who have, perhaps not unexpectedly, framed suburbia as a disturbingly white, middle-class, feminized space. This conventional perspective will serve as our starting point, and we will begin by considering how Richard Yates's classic suburban drama *Revolutionary Road* (1961) mostly adheres to it. From there on, however, we will branch out and examine the ways in which female writers and writers of color have adapted and, in some cases, subverted these genre conventions, first by going back a few years to Maude Hutchins's *Victorine* (1959) and its Lynchian take on sex and the suburbs, then to Gloria Naylor's hell-like vision of Black suburbia in *Linden Hills* (1985), and finally to Chang-Rae Lee's contemporary account of suburban life and mixed identity in *Aloft* (2004).

Ultimately, our goal will be to find out why it is that writers from such a wide range of different backgrounds keep returning, decade after decade, to the suburbs. What is it that makes suburbia so disturbing, so morbidly fascinating that it has given rise to an entire subgenre?

Kommentar

This class sets out to trace the project of Pearl S. Buck (1892-1973), a woman writer of worldwide recognition at her time who later on fell into oblivion.

Born as the daughter of American missionaries, Pearl Buck lived the first half of her life in a bilingual environment in China and spent the rest of her life travelling back and forth between the United States and Asia. She led a career that extended well beyond her eighty works of fiction and nonfiction and deep into the public (political) sphere. Passionately committed to the cause of social justice, Buck was active in the American civil rights and women's rights movements, and founded the first international adoption agency. Pearl

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Buck was an advocate of racial understanding and a vital cultural ambassador between the United States and China. Her socio-political activism made her one of the most interesting figures to influence American and Chinese cultural and literary history in the 20th century. Today, she is best known for her novel *The Good Earth* (1931), which won a Nobel Prize as well as a Pulitzer, but also the rest of her oeuvre is very much characterized by her attempt to create what might be called a distinct 'American China.'

In this class, we will discuss the project of this fascinating and controversial writer against the backdrop of its negotiation of diasporic experience, concepts of the 'self' and the 'other,' as well as its positioning in the context of middlebrow studies.

Class readings (such as excerpts and essays of Buck's project) will be provided in a reader at the beginning of the semester; but you need to purchase the three novels which we will read in full length. These are Pearl S. Buck's *The Good Earth* (Washington Square Press), East *Wind*, *West Wind* (Moyer Bell), and *Kinfolk* (Moyer Bell). Please note that while the editions listed here are preferred, other editions would be acceptable too.

In the context of mass extinction, loss of habitat and the commodification of nonhuman animals, literary texts are increasingly attempting to imagine the world from nonhuman perspectives. Within the emerging field of literary animal studies, which is concerned with the representation as well as the ethical and political implications of animals in literature, this class will consider how animal minds, emotions, perceptions, languages and cultures are presented in "convincing" ways.

Can the perspectives of animals ever be mediated by human languages? In which ways are other-than-human lifeways evoked? What might be the potentials but also the dangers of texts that employ animal narrators and focalizers? Focusing on fiction since the late twentieth century, we will discuss techniques and concepts such as literary perspective, defamiliarization, anthropomorphism and nonhuman agency in order to ask how and why

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the perspectives of nonhuman animals are imagined in literature and, moreover, how these texts engage with urgent human-animal concerns of our time.

Poetry has long been understood as the form of literature that addresses silences as well as "the unlanguagable," be it philosophical, political or spiritual in nature. The Nobel Laureate Joseph Brodsky went so far as to suggest that poetry contains a unique type of thought that is specific to verse. But what are the tools and realms of poetry's estate? The seminar will take a laboratory approach to poetry in English, coupling close analytical and historical readings with practicums that allow students to understand poetic forms and logic from the inside. This class will explore American literature concerned with non-violence. Taking a historical perpective we will look at the influence of the American pacifist tradition—including writers such as Ballou and Thoreau—on the non-violent thought of Tolstoy and Gandhi, as well as Martin Luther King's interpretation of these sources as a central pillar of the 1960s civil rights movement. We will study King's seminal essays, memoir and sermons, as well as the writings of other social activists such as Dorothy Day, and the impact of the non-violent tradition on texts such as James Baldwin's *The Fire New Time*. We will explore the themes of power, violence, poverty, inequality and forgiveness, among others. The course will also address more recent writings on non-violence—as well as critical texts and arguments against non-violence—and the relevancy of this body of literature for the 21st century, in particular in the light of social movements such as Black Lives Matter and the rise of right-wing populism.

This is the second in a series of four lecture courses devoted to exploring the cultural history of American literature. It is designed to provide an overview of U.S.-American literary and cultural history, beginning roughly with the burning of the U.S.S. Philadelphia in Tripoli Harbor in 1804 and ending with the explosion of the U.S.S. Maine in Havana Harbor in 1898. As these framing examples suggest, the course will approach American literature and culture from an international perspective, considering both its relation overseas engagements and continental expansion, but also, more generally, American culture as part of part of the process of transnational dialogue and exchange that led to the modern era. As Emily Dickinson put it, "There is no frigate like a book." We will consider sentimentalism, Transcendentalism, and the various authors of the American Renaissance. We will read poetry in various forms, and also trace the development of various narrative genres and modes, placing romance, realism, regionalism, and naturalism in their historical context. We will consider painting, architecture, and popular culture, the emergence of photography, and their connection to major domestic crises such as the Civil War. We will also consider political movements such as abolitionism and the slave narrative as a foundational American genre. The aim of the lectures is to chart the cultural course of a new nation expanding geographically, financially, and politically, from the first hesitant attempts to consolidate the gains of the Revolutionary War to the self-confident maneuvering of a global player on the threshold of the "American century."

Can animals make "art?" And if so, what might that mean in terms of our obligations to them? From dancing cockatiel sensations on Youtube to megastar Laurie Anderson's Central Park NYC concert for dogs (yes, FOR, not about), artists, theorists, scientists, and humanities scholars have recently begun to explore this question in a multi-faceted way.

We will take this provocative question as our starting point for investigating performances, and public and scientific discourses about performances, of music, dance, and art making by non-human animals. We will combine this with an exploration of contemporary depictions of non-human animals by artists from Banksy to Damien Hirst to Isa Leshko and others who are actively exploring human-animal relations not only as visual material for their compositions, but also more deeply as a conceptual and theoretical investigatory focus for their art explorations. We will also encounter cross-species efforts at art-making collaboration, and questions like, can a gorilla own a copyright for a picture?

We will take a close look at contemporary popular culture's depictions of animals too, from animals on Tik Tok to memes to the mysterious popularity of cat videos on Instagram. What goes on in this passion to represent animals in media? What cultural work are such images and phenomena doing? How might it relate to other art world practices beyond popular culture into the world of museums, fashion, etc.?

Kommentar

Climate change and its global effects, oceans full of (micro)plastics, the extraction of fossil fuels, metals, and other natural "resources," agriculture and livestock industries responsible for large-scale deforestation and the destruction of wildlife habitats all have detrimental effects on the environment—on particular regions as well as the life on our planet more generally. The damage done by unsustainable industries, toxic waste, and the accelerating loss of species and habitats: these are important topics that environmental documentaries address and that we will be concerned with in this course. We will systemically analyze the political, ecological, and ethical questions raised by films such as Al Gore's Inconvenient Sequel (2017), Leonardo di Caprio's Before the Flood (2016), the television series Years of Living Dangerously (2014-) on global warming and other issues that features different celebrity hosts. We also consider films that address more specific environmental issues: Tapped (2009) on the bottled water industry, or GasLand (2010) on the harmful effects of hydraulic fracturing or "fracking," and Cowspiracy: The Sustainability Secret (2014) on the detrimental impact of livestock industries on the environment. We also consider the films, photography and books by the Canadian filmmaker Jennifer Baichwal and photographer Edward Burtynsky.

At stake are the many ways in which the future of our planet Earth is imperiled. Watching environmental films can be a disheartening experience, and one purpose of the genre is to raise awareness for the urgent issues they address. The aim of the course is not just to consider the environmental issues raised by these films, but also to analyze the strategies for presenting them: How do the films appeal to their viewers' conscience and to our emotions? How do they convey a sense of urgency? What narratives, images and rhetoric are employed? What role do the filmmakers themselves play as protagonists (celebrities, politicians, journalists)? How do they integrate scientific research, legal action, political and ethical questions? What cinematic and narrative modes are used? In order to discuss these questions, we will read theory and secondary literature that will allow us to develop a critical perspective on documentary films as a genre and a narrative medium.

A final selection of films will be presented with the syllabus in the first meeting. You are encouraged to watch the films listed here in advance. Some of them are available via Netflix and other streaming services.

This course focuses on morpho-syntactic properties of Determiner Phrases (DPs). In the first part we will discuss the structure of the DP looking at different types of nominal expressions and phenomena (pronouns, gerunds, event and result nominalizations, possessive structures etc.) as a testing ground for the DP Hypothesis. Bemerkung

The term *island* describes the observation that some domains may not be left by movement. For instance, a sentence such as *Which book did you like the man [relative who read]? is judged as ungrammatical since the relative clause forms an *island* from which the wh-phrase in angled brackets cannot "escape". In contrast, a complement clause does not constitute an island: Which book did you think [complement that the man read]? Crucially, we find islands in any particular language but they differ cross-linguistically too. What is the source of island effects? What are islands to begin with? Are islands syntactically impossible structures, or are they semantically weird? Do islands arise in the course of mapping thought to the phonological interface or do islands reflect processing difficulties?

We will travel to various islands together and discuss whether the journey is syntactically driven or not.

This suited the talents of such writers as the journalist Daniel Defoe who was a Dissenter and whose novel, Robinson Crusoe (1719), provided the sort of authenticity that readers of the time would have felt most attracted to. Others followed, thus setting up a tradition of the realist English novel which also includes Crusoe's Moll Flanders, and novels by Samuel Richardson, Henry Fielding, and Laurence Sterne. This narrative of the English novel has been challenged on several counts, the principal of which are Watt's foregrounding of realism as a quality of the novel and his canonization of some writers at the cost of their significant predecessors. With regard to the latter, scholars have taken Watt to task for ignoring the three female writers that allegedly formed the "Fair triumvirate of Wit" in late 17th - early 18th century and who had already authored novels in the English language, namely Aphra Behn, Delariviere Manley, and Eliza Haywood.

This course will include both Ian Watt's study and its reception, and a list of novels pertaining to the topic. The choice of texts is a difficult one, but students are requested to get their own copies of Ian Watt's *The Rise of the Novel* as well as *Oroonoko* by Aphra Behn, *Robinson Crusoe* by Daniel Defoe, *Pamela* by Samuel Richardson, and *Joseph Andrews* by Henry Fielding. Kommentar

At least since classical antiquity, the sea has been a fruitful source of inspiration for the production and transmission of stories, and the representation of the sea in literature has undergone numerous and significant transformations throughout history. In this seminar, we will focus on the transformations it underwent from the late nineteenth century to the opening decades of the twentieth century, taking as a starting point the genre of modernist sea narratives.

Less concerned with sea journeys or with the actuality of the life at sea, and more focussed on the subjectivity and the inner development of the protagonists, modernist sea narratives are characterised by a re-interpretation of the sea itself and of the constitutive elements of this spatial, symbolic, and cultural dimension.

Starting from texts by Joseph Conrad, the course will focus on selected texts by two of the main exponents of High Modernism: Virginia Woolf and James Joyce.

Scottish migration has shaped the national history of Canada to a great extent, but it also has to be contextualized within a transatlantic framework and British history, for instance as part of the conflicts over imperial expansion in North America between Britain and France. The Scots arrived early in Canada setting up the colony of Nova Scotia in 1622, most of them Catholics fleeing persecution. Later, 18th-century Scottish immigrants were mainly evicted farmers, victims of the Highland Clearances who settled down in Upper Canada (roughly today"s Ontario), Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton Island (Nova Scotia). The 19th century saw the establishment of Scottish settlements on Prince Edward Island and in Manitoba as well as a rise in immigration numbers. The preferred destinations of these Presbyterian, English-speaking immigrants were Quebec and Ontario.

A large number of renowned Scottish-Canadian writers have engaged creatively with Scottish history and immigration in their works. They tell stories of emigration and arrival, and of the communal and individual struggles involved in building news homes and establishing new identities. They delve into myth and tradition, and into the Scottish past in order to explain the Canadian present. The works we shall deal with are located in the Maritimes, Ontario and Manitoba and were written by prominent Canadian authors of novels and short stories. Our reading list includes Margaret Laurence, *The Diviners* (1974), Alistair Macleod, *No Great Mischief* (1999) and Alice Munro, *The View from Castle Rock* (2006), along with a list of shorter texts which will be provided via Stud.IP. Please get your own copies of all required reading and do the reading before the start of the Summer School.

Kommentar

At least since classical antiquity, the sea has been a fruitful source of inspiration for the production and transmission of stories, and the representation of the sea in literature has undergone numerous and significant transformations throughout history. In this seminar, we will focus on the transformations it underwent from the late nineteenth century to the opening decades of the twentieth century, taking as a starting point the genre of modernist sea narratives.

Less concerned with sea journeys or with the actuality of the life at sea, and more focussed on the subjectivity and the inner development of the protagonists, modernist sea narratives are characterised by a re-interpretation of the sea itself and of the constitutive elements of this spatial, symbolic, and cultural dimension.

Starting from texts by Joseph Conrad, the course will focus on selected texts by two of the main exponents of High Modernism: Virginia Woolf and James Joyce.

Kommentar

Scottish migration has shaped the national history of Canada to a great extent, but it also has to be contextualized within a transatlantic framework and British history, for instance as part of the conflicts over imperial expansion in North America between Britain and France. The Scots arrived early in Canada setting up the colony of Nova Scotia in 1622, most of them Catholics fleeing persecution. Later, 18th-century Scottish immigrants were mainly evicted farmers, victims of the Highland Clearances who settled down in Upper Canada (roughly today"s Ontario), Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton Island (Nova Scotia). The 19th century saw the establishment of Scottish settlements on Prince Edward Island and in Manitoba as well as a rise in immigration numbers. The preferred destinations of these Presbyterian, English-speaking immigrants were Quebec and Ontario.

A large number of renowned Scottish-Canadian writers have engaged creatively with Scottish history and immigration in their works. They tell stories of emigration and arrival, and of the communal and individual struggles involved in building news homes and establishing new identities. They delve into myth and tradition, and into the Scottish past in order to explain the Canadian present. The works we shall deal with are located in the Maritimes, Ontario and Manitoba and were written by prominent Canadian authors of novels and short stories. Our reading list includes Margaret Laurence, *The Diviners* (1974), Alistair Macleod, *No Great Mischief* (1999) and Alice Munro, *The View from Castle Rock* (2006), along with a list of shorter texts which will be provided via Stud.IP. Please get your own copies of all required reading and do the reading before the start of the Summer School.

Kommentar

In this course we will engage with the various forms in which literary texts and art works constitute worlds: the narrative strategies of fiction and nonfiction will be considered along with visual arts, including larger installations and assemblages. Starting from the presumption that world building largely depends on the imagination of readers and audiences, their conjecture and emotional investment, we will engage with the following questions: How do readers immerse themselves in what they read? How do they come to inhabit the life worlds of characters, whether real or fictional, human or nonhuman? How do texts and art works prompt us to imagine worlds that reach into historically, culturally, and geographically unfamiliar terrains?

We will address these questions by considering short stories, novels, and contemporary art. In order to approach world building as a concept, we will study relevant theoretical texts by Mikhail Bahktin, Wolfgang Iser, David Herman, Hannah Meretoja and Alexandra Horowitz, ranging from narratology and literary anthropology to etiology and art history.

Semester: Sommer 2022

Primary texts include Ocean Vuong's novel *On Earth We're Briefly Gorgeous*; short stories by Lucia Berlin, Lauren Groff, George Saunders and selected poetry. Furthermore, *a one-day excursion* to the upcoming *documenta 15* in Kassel (18 June—25 Sep 2022), directed by the artists' collective ruangrupa (Jakarta), will constitute a relevant component of the seminar: much of contemporary art deals with the political, cultural and ecological dimensions of the world(s) we share with other earth-dwellers—the challenges posed by migration, the current pandemic, poverty, generational conflict and climate change as well as new ideas of collectivity and cohabitation in the 21st century.

Kommentar

This class will be taught by our guest professor Dr. Jane Desmond; Dr. Künnemann is listed here for administrative reasons

Although this course is anchored in cultural anthropology and draws on its signature research method and writing genre of "ethnography," it reaches outward to embrace multiple intellectual communities who have become deeply engaged with questions of the "animal turn" and the turn toward reconceiving our world of investigation as "post-human" or the "more than human," including literature and multi-media. Post-humanism challenges us to embrace a paradigm shift from one in which humans are the center of meaning to one that recognizes that humans are not the only beings living in, acting upon, and making meaning in the world. How might ethnography, a mode of research and genre of writing traditionally based on long-term immersion in various communities, be reconceived when our object of investigation changes -- (now no longer solely focused on human communities, but on more-than-human communities)? For example, "How," as John Hartigan provocatively asks, "do you interview a plant?!"

Given both the imperial/colonial and anti-racist origins of early anthropological thinking a hundred years ago, and the "decolonizing" efforts within the field since the mid 1980s, how might we engage the concept of "ethnography" as a way of knowing now? What are our (researcher) obligations to a wider world and to one that exceeds the human? How is ethnography transforming to meet the challenges of enlarging our focus to include the "more than human"—the cohabitants of human worlds like non-human animals, like "forces of nature" such as gravity -- "Vibrant Matter" in Jane Bennett's compelling words -- and of multiple conceptions of a world that is comprised, in various cosmologies including those of some indigenous groups, as always already more-than-human?

Finally, we must ask, what is the goal of the work we will do? How can these new questions produce, ultimately, new forms of knowledge? New forms of writing and image-making? Can this new knowledge be leveraged to help create a more just world? How must our modes of research, of analysis, of creative work, and of public engagement evolve to address this challenge?

Our readings and viewings will be anchored in the North American setting but placed in comparative dimension by readings focused in other regions too. Beyond reading, viewing, and discussion, we will experiment in this seminar with ways of "imagining otherwise" as we try to reimagine "ethnography" as a practice involving the more than human worlds. We might do bird watching, listening to rivers, attend to plants, imagine the divergent life of biota in the gut...and so on. Each of these experimental exercises will hone our attentiveness in different ways and also reveal the limits of previous methods. Become comfortable with an exploratory mindset that tries something with no guarantee of a "successful" outcome. "Success" lies not in the product but in the process of learning, questioning, and refashioning. That too is part of the epistemology of exploration for this seminar.

Kommentar

"The idea that family values—by which one meant women's values—could shape the body politic did, in fact, lose force after the Civil War. Middle-class women wanting to do something in the world now began to enter the world directly, in large numbers, and without apology, thereby creating the New Woman by the century's end" (Nina Baym, Introduction, *The Lamplighter*).

This class sets out to discuss the emergence of the 'New Woman' and the movement surrounding this socio-cultural phenomenon. We will trace the origins and the dynamic development of this almost iconic - and highly controversial - figure in the American literary and cultural scene of the late nineteenth and early twentieth century, focusing on the variegated genres and styles of writing that address new womanhood. The 'new woman question,' as it was often dubbed at the time, revolved around heated debates of gender inequality, the promotion of various reform movements in the U.S. of those years, the oscillation between the private and the public sphere, and the critique of the concept of 'true womanhood,' the powerful predecessor of new womanhood.

In order to trace these topics and concepts, we will first investigate theoretical texts that engage with the new woman movement of the late 19th and early 20th century, reflecting upon the concept's embeddedness in political and socio-economic discourses of the time, and then relate those findings to selected fictional accounts of the new woman in U.S.-American texts. Our discussions will center on the cartoons of the *Brinkley Girls* by Nell Brinkley, Charlotte Perkins Gilman's "The Yellow Wall-Paper", Henry James's *The Bostonians*, Theodore Dreiser's *Sister Carrie*, Kate Chopin's *The Awakening*, and Dorothy Canfield Fisher's *The Home-Maker*. Please note that this is a preliminary list which will be finalized by the beginning of the summer semester.

A number of readings will come in the form of excerpts or single chapters; most texts will be made available in an e-reader via Stud.IP, but you are asked to purchase the following four novels which we will discuss in full length:

Kommentar

This course will introduce students to the writing of Ralph Waldo Emerson through close readings of some of his most famous essays and lectures. The focus will be philosophical but also stylistic. We will explore how Emerson's unique style informs what he has to say. In deciphering his arguments and his devices, we will enlist the assistance of some of his most dedicated contemporary readers including Stanley Cavell, Lawrence Buell, and Sharon Cameron. Their dialogues with this major US-American thinker alert us to the presence of the everyday in Emerson's philosophical idealism, his concern with disappointment, loss, grief, loneliness, and the sometimes overwhelming pressure to conform. Everyday Emerson encourages us to trust ourselves and find sustenance in nature. He also encourages us to question who the self is and what nature means. Emerson was a thinker who in many ways anticipated self-help authors in his passion for personal improvement. He also shows himself to be forward-looking in remarks that anticipate contemporary psychology and ecology. His contemporaries took him therapeutically. We will see what resources he has to offer in facing the challenges of our time.

Please acquire the Library of America edition of *Ralph Waldo Emerson: Essays and Lectures*. If that is too expensive, you can also look for a used copy of the Viking Portable Library *Emerson*, edited by Carl Bode and Malcolm Cowley. Though Emerson's writing is widely available online, I recommend acquiring a book you can carry around, mark up, and keep on your night stand.

The extant body of Early Middle English writings is often eclipsed by the centuries-long engagement of academic and non-academic readers with Chaucer and his ilk. So much so that the relative paucity of original material has become part and parcel of a narrative of English oppression, linguistic and otherwise, by the French. In this course we shall challenge such broad narratives and study a selection of texts both with respect to linguistic developments as well as with the aim of a fair appreciation of their literary merits. Among the topics to be covered are the survival of written English and the ongoing copying of Old English texts, the shape of emergent Middle English, variation and variability of English against the multilingual backdrop of twelfth- and thirteenth-century England. The selection of texts includes extracts from the *Orrmulum*, Layamon"s Arthurian *Brut*-chronicle, the debate poem *The Owl and the Nightingale*, *Ancrene Wisse* (a guide for female hermits) and some shorter texts including proverbs and recipes. Students will be introduced to Early Middle English so as to be able to read and translate the original texts.

Kommentar

Natural language processing is the interpretation and generation of human language by computational means. For living languages, this includes spoken or signed modes of communication as well as the written word, and large languages such as English or Mandarin have been so thoroughly modelled that we need only plug into a Google API to gain access to predictive text input, speech-to-text engines, grammar checks, and translation. By contrast, our access to premodern languages is primarily text-based, and what modest machine learning has been brought to bear on them has overwhelmingly favoured such larger languages as Latin. What few off-the-shelf libraries are available for the analysis of Old English, for instance, are limited and in great need of correction. The computational handling of these corpora accordingly takes us back to the basics: manipulating strings of text.

In this course, you will learn to deploy such Python libraries as NLTK, spaCy, and CLTK as well as the Python Standard Library and regular expressions to organize Modern English and Old English text and generate statistics on the basis of plaintext and XML text corpora. You will try your hand at tokenization, *n*-grams, stemming, lemmatization, and part-of-speech tagging, while learning key principles from the realms of linear algebra and

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> machine learning along the way so you may develop an understanding of what separates the abilities of humans and machines to process language, and how to go about training a machine to help out with your research or other text-based projects.

> The course assumes no prior knowledge of Python, algebra, or machine learning, and students in modules outside the English Department in particular are not expected to have a prior knowledge of Old English.

The term *island* describes the observation that some domains may not be left by movement. For instance, a sentence such as *Which book did you like the man [relative who read]? is judged as ungrammatical since the relative clause forms an *island* from which the wh-phrase in angled brackets cannot "escape". In contrast, a complement clause does not constitute an island: Which book did you think [complement that the man read]? Crucially, we find islands in any particular language but they differ cross-linguistically too. What is the source of island effects? What are islands to begin with? Are islands syntactically impossible structures, or are they semantically weird? Do islands arise in the course of mapping thought to the phonological interface or do islands reflect processing difficulties?

We will travel to various islands together and discuss whether the journey is syntactically driven or not.

This is an intermediate (Vertiefung) / advanced course for students who enjoy creative writing in English. For BA students it is not part of the core curriculum; Master students can use it for M.EP.032-N. Every year, the English Department takes some forty students to Scotland for a two-week summer school to explore Edinburgh's city centre, the history, literature and culture of Scotland, connections between Scottish and other cultures, and to get immersed in Edinburgh's many festivals. This year, like 2020 and 2021, the summer school cannot take place due to the COVID-19 pandemic. For students interested in studying festival culture and the reception and mediation of literature at a literary festival, this unit offers a chance of learning about and exploring festivals in remote form.

As part of the unit, students are expected to write a blog accompanying their work on the self-study unit texts and tasks which serves as both a continuous write-up of findings and as a reflection on ideas and thoughts. For the final project report, students fuse their findings on Scottish literature, canon-building and canonicity with what they have observed in readings and by analysing websites.
