GVBl. S. 69), amended by Article 1 of the Act dated 15.12.2015 (Nds. GVBl. p. 384); § 37 section 1 p. 3 no. 5 b) NHG, § 44 section 1 p. 3 NHG).

## **Examination and study regulations**

### **for the consecutive master's programme "Development Economics"**

### **at the Georg-August-Universität Göttingen**

#### **§ 1 Scope and faculties involved**

(1) The provisions of the "General Examination Regulations for the Bachelor and Master Programmes and other degree programmes offered at the University of Göttingen" (APO) as well as the "Framework Examination Regulations for Master Programmes at the Faculty of Economic Sciences" apply to the consecutive master programme in "Development Economics" at Georg-August Universität Göttingen.

(2) These regulations stipulate the additional provisions for the Master Programme degree.

(3) <sup>1</sup>The Master Programme in "Development Economics" is offered jointly by the Faculty of Economic Sciences and the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences. <sup>2</sup>Umbrella faculty is the Faculty of Economic Sciences. <sup>3</sup>The degree programme is taught in English.

## **§ 2 Aim of the qualification**

<sup>1</sup>Faced with the requirements and changes in the professional world, graduates should acquire the knowledge, skills and methods of economics and agricultural economics with a special focus on questions of development and should hence be in a position to produce independent academic work, to critically classify academic insight and to act within a responsible framework in addition to the general aims of the master programme defined in RPO-MA. <sup>2</sup>They should therefore be equipped to launch a successful professional career or to progress to doctoral studies. <sup>3</sup>Development economics is the term used to describe the specific field of economics that focuses on the developmental differences between individual countries. <sup>4</sup>In this, the main emphasis is placed on developing countries, the economic reasons for underdevelopment and proposals for development policies. <sup>5</sup>Agricultural economics plays a significant role in this context, for instance in solutions to the global food problems. <sup>6</sup>Graduates are prepared for work in the occupational field of development policies and economy (including both research and practical development policies). <sup>7</sup>In addition to academic careers, this includes above all national institutions within development cooperation (GIZ, KfW, ministry, other smaller organisations) and international organisations (World Bank, UN system, regional development banks, EU) in development cooperation.

## **§ 3 Recommended prior knowledge**

<sup>1</sup>In the master programme, it is very beneficial in particular to have established knowledge of the English language, mathematics, statistics and computer skills. <sup>2</sup>Students whose credits in mathematics and statistics were not better than satisfactory in the course of their preliminary studies, and whose English and/or computer skills are low, are recommended to qualify themselves appropriately before taking on the master programme.

## **§ 4 Structure of the academic programme, contents of study and course of studies**

(1) <sup>1</sup>The 120 C which must be completed over the standard course length of the master programme in Development Economics of four semesters are comprised as follows:


1. Compulsory part of the programme	24 C
2. Subject-specific specialisation	12 C
3. Optional required module	36 C
4. Optional area	18 C
5. Master thesis	30 C

<sup>2</sup>The compulsory modules, optional required modules and optional modules to be completed are specified in the module overview (appendix 1).

(2) <sup>1</sup>Admission to write the master thesis is conditional upon earning 18 C from the compulsory part of the programme, 6 C of which shall be by successfully completing a seminar course. <sup>2</sup>Time to complete the thesis is 20 weeks. <sup>3</sup> 30 credits are awarded for successful completion of the master thesis.

(3)<sup>1</sup>Study abroad for at least one semester at a foreign university is an integral part of the master programme in Development Economics for students who have acquired their university entrance qualification in the Federal Republic of Germany or in a country or a region in which German is the official language. <sup>2</sup>During the stay abroad, study and examination components with a rating of 30 C should be completed as a rule; however, completion of components with a rating of at least 18 C should be proven and provided. <sup>3</sup>The components must correspond essentially to the qualification standard of a master programme and may not be part of a module exam that has been passed or pending completion as part of this degree programme before the stay abroad. <sup>4</sup>Transfer of examination components can be stipulated by conclusion of a "learning agreement" before the stay abroad. <sup>5</sup>Upon application, the examination board can exempt students from the obligation to stay abroad, if a stay abroad has been proven in the preceding degree programme, in which at least 18 C were acquired and accepted. <sup>6</sup>Exemption is also possible if the stay abroad is intended as part of the field research for the master thesis and this is confirmed by the academic advisor for the master thesis. <sup>7</sup>Failed examination components as part of compulsory study abroad at a foreign university can be retaken at the University of Göttingen.

(4) The following graphic shows a schematic overview of the breakdown of the master programme in Development Economics



## § 5 Amendments

<sup>1</sup>Amendments to these study and examination regulations will be decided on by the Faculty Council of the Faculty of Economic Sciences. <sup>2</sup>Before any corresponding resolutions are passed, the Faculty Council of the Faculty of Agricultural Economy must be given suitable opportunity for deliberations.

## **§ 6 Double Degree with the University of Stellenbosch**

(1) <sup>1</sup>The University of Göttingen and the University of Stellenbosch join in organising a double degree programme. <sup>2</sup>The provisions of these examination and study regulations shall apply, provided that the following does not stipulate any other procedure. <sup>3</sup>The regulations in place at the University of Stellenbosch shall apply exclusively to the modules offered by the University of Stellenbosch.

(2) Students at the master's programme "Development Economics" are eligible to take part in this programme in accordance with the provisions laid down in the following regulations.

(3) <sup>1</sup>A selection procedure will be carried out for the 5 places allocated to the students in the master programme "Development Economics". <sup>2</sup>The selection committee consists of the person responsible for the master programme "Development Economics", the double degree coordinator and one teaching member of the faculty group at the Faculty of Economic Sciences; one member of the student body will also be included in an advisory capacity. <sup>3</sup>The member of the faculty group and the student body will be appointed by the corresponding faculty representation on the Faculty Council at the Faculty of Economic Sciences.

(4) <sup>1</sup>The application for inclusion in the double degree programme must be submitted to the Dean's Office at the Faculty of Economic Sciences by no later than May 15. <sup>2</sup>The following documents must be enclosed with the application:

- the diploma from the applicant's previous degree programme in the form of certified copies or certified English translations; in the event that a diploma has not yet been received, students must submit certification of the modules completed, the credits and the average grade, along with an assessment of the thesis completed in the previous degree course.

- modules completed in economics and/or agricultural economics in an accumulated scope of at least 60 credits;

- modules completed in economic theory, agricultural economics and development economics in an accumulated scope of at least 30 credits;

- a written presentation in the English language, detailing the applicant's motivation for inclusion in the double degree programme and the aims of his or her studies and

- a curriculum vitae in tabular form and in the English language, detailing concisely the educational path that demonstrates which practical professional skills and other specialist qualifications or periods spent abroad the applicant is able to present.

(5) The selection committee in the degree programme makes its selection on the basis of the following criteria.

a) The following qualifications for entry shall apply:

- aa) The grade for the thesis in the previous degree programme must be at least 2.50;

- bb) The overall grade in the modules completed in economics and/or agricultural economics with an accumulated scope of at least 60 credits must be at least 2.50;

- cc) Knowledge accumulated in modules in development economics and agricultural economics must be proven with a scope of at least 10 C.

b) Selection of the applicants who are eligible in accordance with the criteria laid down in a) will take place on the basis of a points scale. These points will be awarded according to the following criteria.

aa) Current average grade in the degree programme that is the basis for the application (maximum 8 points):

In the event of equal points, the grade from the Bachelor degree or an equivalent degree will be deemed decisive.

(6) <sup>1</sup>Students spend the first semester (winter semester, period of lectures: October to February) at the University of Göttingen, and the following year of studies (period of lectures: February to May and July to October), completion of the master thesis November to March) at the University of Stellenbosch. <sup>2</sup>By way of derogation from sentence 1, the semester required to complete the master thesis can also be spent at the University of Göttingen. (5) <sup>3</sup>The students spend the fourth semester at the University of Göttingen. <sup>4</sup>This results in the following structure of studies:

1. Advanced economics (Göttingen)	30 C
2. Studies abroad (Stellenbosch)	30 C
3. Master thesis (Göttingen or Stellenbosch)	30 C
4. Specialised degree programme (Göttingen)	30 C

<sup>5</sup>The precise structure of studies and the electable modules are listed in Appendix II.

(7) <sup>1</sup>Examinations for modules that were not successfully completed can be repeated at the partner university also. <sup>2</sup>In this, the examination regulations issued by the university offering the module shall apply; examiners at the university offering the module shall also evaluate the examinations.

(8) <sup>1</sup>All students participating in the double degree programme with the University of Stellenbosch must successfully complete their master thesis with a scope of 30 C. <sup>2</sup>The academic advisers for the master thesis will be one examiner at the University of Göttingen and one examiner at the University of Stellenbosch. <sup>3</sup>The master thesis must be written in English. <sup>4</sup>In the event that the master thesis is completed at the University of Stellenbosch, the examination regulations in force at the University of Stellenbosch shall apply to admission, supervision and assessment. <sup>5</sup>The academic adviser, resp. the evaluator from Göttingen must be an authorised examiner at the University of Göttingen; following notification by the University of Stellenbosch, they are appointed by the Examinations Office at the Faculty of Economic Sciences. <sup>6</sup>In the event that the master thesis is completed at the University of Göttingen, the study and examination regulations in force there shall apply.

(9) Following successful completion of the master examination, the University of Göttingen awards the university degree "Master of Arts (M.A.)" and the University of Stellenbosch awards the university degree "Master of Commerce (MComm)".

(10) <sup>1</sup> Each university will issue a degree certificate for the university degree they award, whereby the two degree certificates are integrated in such a way as to represent one single degree certificate in terms of content. <sup>2</sup>The degree certificate can only be issued in an integrated form. <sup>3</sup>The University of Göttingen issues the degree certificate in the English or on request the German language with the date of certificate; in addition to stating the degree programme, the degree certificate also specifies the bi-national structure.

(11) <sup>1</sup>The two university degrees can be listed as separate titles. <sup>2</sup>In the event that both university degrees are listed as titles, they shall be connected by a hyphen; the same applies

to the abbreviated form. <sup>3</sup>This does not affect the statutory provisions concerning the listing as titles of foreign university degrees.

## **§ 7 Entry into force**

(1) The regulation enters into force following its promulgation in the official announcements of Georg-August-Universität Göttingen as per 01.04.2012.

(2) At the same time, the examination regulations for the master degree programme "Development Economics" in the version contained in the announcement dated 30.09.2011 (Official Announcements I no. 8/2011 S. 470) and the study regulations for the master degree programme "Development Economics" in the version contained in the announcement dated 30.09.2011 (Official Announcements I no. 8/2011 S. 475) shall cease to be effective.

(3) <sup>1</sup>Students who commenced their academic programme before these study and examination regulations came into force will be examined exclusively on the basis of these study and examination regulations. <sup>2</sup>This does not apply:

a) In the event that other regulations than those specified in paragraph 2 apply to individual students on the basis of provisions concerning examination regulations that have been in force to date, and

b) In the event that a bond of trust with a student renders appropriate a different decision on the part of the examination board.

<sup>3</sup>This decision as specified under letter b) is possible especially in cases in which a module examination can be retaken or a compulsory module has been changed substantially or removed. <sup>4</sup>The examination board can stipulate general regulations for this. <sup>5</sup>Modules and periods of studies completed before these study and examination regulations come into force remain unaffected. <sup>6</sup>Examinations based on regulations valid before these study and examination regulations came into force will be held for the last time in the summer semester of 2014.

(4) <sup>1</sup>Students who commenced their academic programme before an amendment to these examination and study regulations came into force and who have remained enrolled therein without interruption, shall be examined on the basis of the examination and study regulations in place before the amendments came into force. <sup>2</sup>In the case of pending examinations, this does not apply to module overviews and descriptions, unless the legal entitlements of a student calls for a different decision by the examination board. <sup>3</sup>This different decision is possible especially in the cases, in which an examination component can be retaken or a compulsory module or an optional required module was changed substantially or removed. <sup>4</sup>The examination board can stipulate general regulations for this. <sup>5</sup>Examinations on the basis of a version of examination and study regulations in place before any amendments thereto came into force, shall be held for the last time in the fourth semester following said amendment coming into force. <sup>6</sup>On application, students affected by sentence<sup>1</sup> shall be examined in general on the basis of the amended regulations.

- b. <sup>1</sup>All modules of the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences from the Master's Programme in "Sustainable International Agriculture" can be selected, as far as the entry qualifications mentioned there are fulfilled. <sup>2</sup>Moreover, the module M.Agr.0079 "Umweltökonomie" rating 6 C can be selected.
- c. <sup>1</sup>Modules from the language courses offered by the university (except English and mother tongue) can be selected; as far as the selected language courses are "Intermediate level" (is equivalent to the 4. level of the selected language) and provided they were not already completed within the preceding degree programme. <sup>2</sup>Differing from sentence 1, the consideration of courses taught in English as well as the mother tongue of the student is excluded.
- d. <sup>1</sup>Students who acquired their university entrance qualification neither in the Federal Republic of Germany nor in another country or region in which German is the official language and for whom the degree programme that represents the basis for entry into the master programme Development Economics was not completed in the German language can also acquire 12 C by successfully completing the modules in "German as a foreign language". <sup>2</sup>However, this does require verification of skills from "Intermediate level" on (is equivalent to the 4. level of the selected language).

b. <sup>1</sup>In the optional area, modules (alternative modules) other than those mentioned can be completed in accordance with the following provisions. <sup>2</sup>The following are required for the consideration of an alternative module:

- aa. A written application to be handed in by the student to the Dean of the Faculty of Economic Sciences before choosing the alternative module;
- bb. Approval by the Dean of Studies of the faculty or teaching body offering the alternative module.

<sup>3</sup>The decision on approving the application is made by the Dean of Studies of the Faculty of Economic Sciences. Before passing the decision, the Dean will obtain the opinion of the degree programme tutors on the usefulness of the module replacement in which the student is enrolled. <sup>4</sup>The application can be rejected without stating any reasons; a legal right of the applicant to appeal the decision does not exist. <sup>5</sup>The consideration of an already completed module as an alternative module is excluded.

## **5. Master thesis (30 C)**

30 C are awarded for successful completion of the master thesis.
